INDEPENDENCE DAY 2015 CELEBRATION - FRIDAY, JULY 3RD

The Independence Day 2015 Celebration, hosted by the Wilmette Park District, will take place on Friday, July 3, at Gillson Park. **Please note:** The annual Fun Run/Walk for Fun, beginning and ending in Gillson Park, will also be held on Friday, July 3.

Games and rides for children, entertainment, roving performers, and a Tastefest are all part of the festivities beginning at 4:00 p.m. on Friday, July 3. A traditional concert of patriotic music by the Palatine Concert Band is scheduled for 7:00 p.m. in the Wallace Bowl. It will be preceded by a preview of the Starlight Theatre musical feature, *Once Upon A Mattress*. The Grand Fireworks display lights up the sky at 9:30 p.m. **There is no rain date for the fireworks.**

Take a Pace Bus to Gillson Park Fireworks

Parking in and near Gillson Park is limited. The easiest way to get to and from the Independence Day celebrations is by using the special Pace shuttle bus service. Motorists may park at Edens Plaza or at the METRA commuter lot. The shuttle bus route will run from Edens Plaza east on Lake Street, south on 12th Street and east on Central Avenue to Gillson Park where passengers will be dropped on Michigan Avenue south of Washington Avenue. Passengers will be picked up all along the route. The shuttle will run about every 10 minutes between 4:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. and then every 5 minutes between 6:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. After the fireworks, the last bus leaves Gillson Park at 11:00 p.m. The charge is \$3.50 round trip, exact fare ONLY and it will be collected eastbound. Tickets will be issued for the return trip. You will be required to present a ticket for the return trip. Riders with a valid Circuit Ride Free permit and children under 7 are free.

Look for the special marked loading areas at the park for your return trip:

- ★ Blue Route: All Stops
- ★ Yellow Route: Metra & all stops up to Lake & Ridge
- ★ Red Route: Express to Edens Plaza

Motorists who do not live near the bus route are encouraged to park their cars for free at the Wilmette Metra commuter lot or the Village Hall lot for a short bus ride to Gillson Park. Or alternatively, park on side streets along the bus route, parking lots around Lake & Ridge, or at Edens Plaza (in the evening), and ride the bus from there.

Important Traffic and Pedestrian Safety Information

Please consider taking public transportation for the July 3rd festivities. When arriving at the park, please make note of the following:

- ★ Beginning at 6:00 p.m., Sheridan Road will be closed to all vehicle traffic between Lake and Isabella.
- ★ A drop-off and pick-up zone will be established in the 900 block of Michigan. Traffic will enter east on Forest and exit west on Lake. Signs will be posted along Sheridan Road north of Lake directing vehicles to this zone.
- ★ Due to the large amount of pedestrian traffic, if you park in the beach lot the Police Department will hold all vehicle traffic leaving Gillson Park until the majority of the pedestrian traffic has cleared the top of the hill. Please expect to wait in your car until the pedestrian traffic has cleared. We appreciate your patience!

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Letter from Village President Bob Bielski

Since 2005, when North Shore Ford vacated the property at 611 Green Bay Road in downtown Wilmette, the Village Board, Village Staff and community as a whole have worked hard to redevelop the property. After

ten long years, the Village Board recently approved a mixed-use development on the site which furthers the goals and objectives of the Village Center Master Plan.

Much thought and effort has gone into the redevelopment of this property, and I would like to share with you the history and process since 2005.

History of the Property

In 2007, a 5-story mixed-use building was approved by the Village Board, but later abandoned by the developer as a result of its failure to secure financing during the beginning of the real estate market downturn.

In 2009 and 2010, two proposed developments were rejected by the Village Board: the first, a medical office building with a drive-thru pharmacy on the first floor and the second, a stand-alone CVS pharmacy with a drive-thru. After the Village Board rejected the stand-alone CVS pharmacy, the developer filed a lawsuit against the Village, seeking approval via the courts to build the project.

In 2011, just prior to the beginning of the trial, the Village settled the lawsuit by purchasing the property from the developer for \$3.675 million.

Master Plan Process

In 2010, the Village Board appointed an Ad Hoc Planning Advisory Committee to create a Village Center Master Plan. The goal of the Village Center Master Plan process was to create and document a shared community vision for the Village Center which included a framework for the redevelopment of downtown Wilmette.

The Village engaged the services of Lakota Group, a leading consulting firm in planning and urban design, to assist with and coordinate the 10-month long plan development process. As part of the process, nearly 400 residents and business owners were interviewed, attended focus groups, open houses, and public workshops to provide guidance on the plan.

Ultimately, these community leaders determined that the Village Center should be a focal point of Wilmette, a vibrant hub for retail, dining and entertainment. To accomplish this, the Plan calls for mixed-use transit-oriented development, including increased densities and building heights, which would help support an exciting commercial district.

The Master Plan was approved by the Plan Commission on December 21, 2010 and adopted by the Village Board as an amendment to the Village's Comprehensive Plan on January 25, 2011.

The Current Project

In 2012, the Village entered into a contract with Lexington Homes to build a 6-story mixed-use development with 90 apartment units and retail on the first floor. Lexington sought to acquire properties adjacent to the site, which would have allowed for a larger, more comprehensive development. However, Lexington was unable to reach agreement with neighboring property owners, and as a result, in early 2014, Lexington decided not to proceed with developing the site.

After Lexington's decision, the Village immediately began marketing the property and received 10 proposals for mixed-use developments. The Village Board and Staff undertook an intensive review process, hiring Gruen + Gruen Associates, experts in land use and market analysis, to assist with evaluation of the proposals. Working with Gruen, the Village Board reviewed all 10 proposals, seeking to determine which best met three primary goals:

- ★ Furtherance of the Village Center Master Plan
- ★ Recovery of the Village's investment in the property
- ★ Certainty of completion

The Board reviewed these proposals in closed meetings to ensure that developers would offer up their best price and concept without knowledge of the terms of competing proposals. The Village Board found that M&R Development's proposal for a 6-story mixed-use project best met these goals. M&R offered to purchase the property for \$4.1 million, an amount which would have more than recovered the Village's investment. M&R's success with similar developments, including a recent mixed-use project nearby in Evanston, provided confidence that the project would be completed.

To initiate the formal public approval process, the Village Board reviewed and subsequently approved a development agreement with M&R at two public meetings in September 2014. At that time, the Village issued a press release regarding the proposed project, included updates in our weekly e-news emails and created a webpage dedicated solely to the project. Multiple stories appeared in local newspapers describing the details of the proposed development.

In spring of 2015, the Plan Commission presided over two public meetings on the proposed development. During those meetings, residents of Wilmette were invited to provide comments on the project, and the Plan Commission worked with the developer to fine tune the plan. In addition, subsequent to the Plan Commission meetings, the Village Board received additional feedback from the community on the project, with a significant number of people stating that the proposed 6-story building was too tall and out of character with the Village Center. In addition, many pointed out that the Village Center Master Plan called for buildings of no more than 5 stories in height.

The Village Board listened to the community's concerns, and Staff diligently negotiated with the developer to achieve a result that was more consistent with the Master Plan. The revised plan reduced the height of the building to 5 stories. *Continued on page 3*



As a result of the building height reduction, the revised development includes 20 fewer apartment units than the original proposed development. With fewer apartment units permitted to be built on the site, the market value of the property decreased. The developer is paying the market value of the property to the Village, and the revised proposal includes a purchase price of \$3.1 million. Given the extensive marketing process and financial review which had been undertaken by the Village Staff and our consultants, the Village Board is confident that the Village is receiving an appropriate price for the property.

While the Village could have recovered more than its investment in the property by allowing a taller building on the property, the Board decided that limiting the building height was more important than fully recovering the Village's investment and that the proposed 5-story building fit better with the Village Center and the Village Center Master Plan.

The Village Board is very excited about moving forward with M&R at this time because this development is an important first step in implementing the Master Plan which will help ensure a vibrant and successful downtown Village Center for years to come.

While the proposed development has been approved by the Village Board, final building plans have not yet been submitted, and we have not yet closed on the sale of the property. Once these items are completed, we are hopeful that construction could begin in late fall or early winter.

This project is one of the most significant real estate developments in the history of our Village, and I would like to thank the many residents and business owners who participated in the creation of the Master Plan, former Village President Chris Canning and previous Village Board members who committed numerous hours to this effort, and members of our community who shared their thoughts over the past several months to help make this project the best it could be for Wilmette.

DOCUMENT DESTRUCTION AND ELECTRONICS RECYCLING EVENT

On Saturday, August 8th the Village will partner with the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC) to host a one-day Document Destruction & Electronics Recycling Event. The event will run from 9:00 a.m. to noon at the Wilmette Public Works Facility, located at 711 Laramie Ave. This event is open to all Wilmette residents and residents of all other SWANCC communities; identification will be checked for proof of residency. Materials from businesses, schools, or institutions will not be accepted.

DOCUMENT DESTRUCTION GUIDELINES

Paper documents must be brought to the event in either paper shopping bags or cardboard boxes - NO PLASTIC BAGS please! To avoid back-up or capacity issues, we must limit residents to six file-size boxes or paper shopping bags per vehicle. Staples and paper clips are acceptable, but binders should be removed.

WATERING REGULATIONS IN EFFECT

During the warm weather months, water restrictions are imposed by the Village as required by the State of Illinois. Sprinkling is prohibited Monday through Friday from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. through September 15th. Sprinkling during prohibited hours may be permitted for a limited time by the Director of Engineering, for newly seeded or sod areas, and for the annual activation or repair of sprinkler systems. To obtain special approval, call (847) 853-7660.

LEAF BLOWER REGULATIONS IN EFFECT

Between May 15th and September 30th, the Village of Wilmette prohibits the use of gasoline-powered leaf blowers. This prohibition includes using an electric leaf blower powered by a portable gasoline generator.

The only exceptions to this prohibition are:

- ★ Use on golf courses, public parks or other Wilmette Park District property
- ★ Use for roof, gutter and downspout cleaning
- ★ Use in paving, repair or patching of public streets and alleys, or for preparation of private asphalt surfaces prior to seal coating.

Residents can aid in helping to curtail the nuisance caused in summer months by leaf blowers; please speak to your landscaping contractor and tell them not to use their leaf blowers during the summer months.

HOLIDAY REFUSE COLLECTION SCHEDULE

Independence Day: NO DELAY. There will be no disruption in service this year due to July 4th falling on a Saturday.

Labor Day: 1-day delay. Refuse, recycling, and yard waste collection services will be delayed by one day in observance of Labor Day on Monday, September 7th. Normal collection will resume the week of September 14th.

INDEPENDENCE DAY FUN RUN & WALK FRIDAY, JULY 3RD, IN GILLSON PARK

The Fun Run, Walk for Fun and Youth Run are among the most popular events held in Gillson Park during our Independence Day Celebration. **Please note:** This year's race will be held on Friday, July 3, **the same day as the fireworks.** The contests begin at 8:00 a.m. for both the Adult Run and Walk. The Youth events are held between 9:15 and 9:55 a.m.

There are six categories for men and women in the Fun Run contest, with awards presented in all categories. The Walk for Fun is for recreation only; no awards are presented. The Youth Run has four age groups (6-7, 8-9, 10-11 and 12-13) to accommodate the large number of entrants. Pee Wee runners are age 5 and under. Awards are given in each of the children's categories.

Early adult registrations are \$25; on the day of the event the adult fee is \$30. The youth registration fee is \$10. **Note:** Pee Wees (5 and under) run for free and registration is not required. Cholesterol and Glucose Screening

The Health Department is offering a Lipid Profile and Glucose screening for residents on Wednesdays, July 15 and September 16, 2015 from 9:00 to 10:00 a.m. in the Training Room of the Village Hall. This screening is by **appointment only and requires a 12 hour fast**. The Lipid Profile includes tests for total cholesterol, HDL cholesterol, LDL cholesterol, Triglycerides, and HDL/LDL ratio. The glucose screening is for the detection of diabetes. The test requires blood drawn from the arm and the results are sent in the mail within 48 hours. The cost of this test is \$20. Adult Hearing Screening

In cooperation with the Audiology Clinic of Northwestern University, the Health Department will offer hearing screening tests for adults on **Friday, July 10, 2015** at the Village Hall from 8:30 a.m. to noon. There is no fee for the service. Many people experience a gradual loss of hearing as they get older. Appointments are required and can be made by contacting the Village Nurse at 853-7507, or baderd@wilmette.com.

A hearing screening is a quick estimate of hearing ability. Screening results will NOT tell you the cause of hearing loss, or if your hearing will change, or if you will benefit from hearing aids. Only a full evaluation by an Audiologist and/or an Otologist can provide that information. If you have dizziness, ringing in the ears, or ear pain, you are strongly encouraged to consult an ear doctor (Otologist or Otolaryngologist) even if you pass this screening.

IS YOUR ADDRESS VISIBLE?

The Wilmette Fire Department would like to take this opportunity to ask residents to re-evaluate the visibility and location of your home address. In an effort to reduce response times and make your home easier to find in an emergency, the WFD is asking for all address signs to be placed near the front door or over an attached garage. The WFD follows Life Safety Code 505.1 that asks residents to have an address sign at least 4.5 inches high and 0.5 inches wide. FIRE HYDRANT TESTING

Fire hydrants will soon be opened, flushed and tested throughout the Village of Wilmette, as the Wilmette Fire Department conducts its annual hydrant testing program. Tests are done to assure that a reliable water supply and distribution system is available in the event of a fire.

The testing process involves flowing water from each hydrant in the village, which stirs up the sediment in the water mains and may cause discolored water to flow into homes and businesses in Wilmette. Although the sediment in the water mains may give tap water an unpleasant appearance, it is not harmful and can be cleared by simply allowing the faucet to run until the water clears.

The hydrant testing program will run through the end of summer. Annual testing is required by the Insurance Service Office and affects the Fire Department's rating.
