LEAF COLLECTION BEGINS OCTOBER 12TH

From October 12th to December 4th, weather permitting, the Village will be providing leaf collection services. Residents who live on residential side streets are asked to rake leaves to the curb. Residents who live on arterial streets (Lake Avenue, Wilmette Avenue, Sheridan Road, Green Bay Road, Ridge Road, Skokie Boulevard and Hibbard Road) should place leaves on the parkway behind the curb due to heavy traffic. In order to be collected, leaves must be in a loose condition, not in bags or containers. Please avoid raking leaves onto the street until two days prior to your scheduled collection day to prevent the clogging of storm drains.

HALLOWEEN TRICK OR TREAT HOURS AND SAFETY

Halloween Trick or Treat hours are from 4:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. on Saturday, October 31st. The Police Department offers the following tips for a safe and spooky Halloween:

- ★ Children should only go to homes where parents know the residents and stay on the porch or front steps to receive treats
- ★ Children should cross the street at the intersection, not in the middle of the street or between parked cars
- ★ Adults should inspect all candy before it is eaten
- ★ Costumes should allow the child to see and hear perfectly. Little ghosts and goblins should be able to hear and see vehicles
- ★ Costumes should be bright colored or have glow-in-the-dark patches so drivers can see the children. Flashlights and glow-sticks can help!
- ★ Go with the kids! It's safer for them

For residents passing out treats, please leave the porch light on during the Trick or Treat hours. It is safer for the children and lets them know treats are available at this home.

Letter from Village President Bob Bielinski

This past summer, activity in the Village's downtown area continued at a very high level with crowded restaurants, special events, and new businesses. Since Labor Day, I've participated in several ribbon cuttings for new businesses, and each ribbon cutting is always very

exciting for me. With winter just around the corner, please continue to patronize our local businesses regardless of the weather.

In this issue of *The Communicator*, I share news and information, and highlight some upcoming community events.

West Park Sanitary Sewer Storage Project

I am pleased to announce that September 2015 marked completion of the first phase of the West Park Sanitary Sewer Storage Project. A 5.5 million gallon underground storage tank under West Park has been completed, and the Park District is in the process of installing a new artificial turf field.

When operational, the West Park Sanitary Sewer Storage Project will help reduce basement backups during rain events for over 1,300 homes west of Romona Road by holding excess storm water which infiltrates the sanitary sewer system. In addition, the installation of a backflow valve will prevent sewage from other communities from backing up into Wilmette's sewer system through our connection to the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District (MWRD).

Here are some interesting facts about the storage tank construction at West Park:

- ★ over 40 million pounds or 1,200 truckloads of concrete was poured,
- ★ the tank contains 1,200 tons of steel, and
- ★ 8,000 dump truck loads of excavated soil were removed from the site.

The next phase of the project continues on Lake Avenue with the installation of the backflow valve. This work will require some lane closures on Lake Avenue, so please be careful when driving in this area while it's under construction. The final component of the system is a pump station that will pump sewage into the MWRD's system which then carries it to wastewater treatment facilities. The West Park project operates much like an overhead sewer which protects residents' basements from sewer backups during storm events, only on a much larger scale.

The West Park project is on schedule to be fully operational in spring of 2016, and the \$18 million project is currently approximately \$500,000 under budget.

2016 Budget and Capital Projects

While the State's budget situation remains unresolved, and its impact on the Village remains unknown, we are planning for 2016 and beyond. Local governments in Illinois do not have complete

control over their finances because of the State's regulatory environment and unfunded mandates imposed by the State, but the Village Board and Staff pride ourselves on being fiscally responsible while continuing to provide excellent services to residents and business owners.

Our budget process never ends as the Village Staff is always looking for ways to reduce expenses and find more efficient and effective ways to deliver municipal services. The Village Board recently met to review our 10-year Capital Improvement Program. Working with the Village Staff, the Board reviews all proposed infrastructure projects and capital expenditures scheduled over the next 10 years. While we do our best to finance these projects, our capital needs always exceed available funding. Accordingly, projects are prioritized based on staff recommendations to ensure that we maintain a high level of service and high quality of life for our residents at a reasonable cost. Next year's funding includes \$2 million for street resurfacing, alley replacement, and brick street renovation, which is an increase of 33% over the 2014 budget.

Like all meetings of the Village Board, our budget meetings are open to the public, and I would encourage residents to attend to learn more about Village finances. While it is a little more than a year old, a State of the Village presentation that provides a good overview of Village finances is still available for viewing on our YouTube channel at <http://tinyurl.com/kuld2um>.

Housing Our Own

I am happy to announce the appointment of the board of directors for the new not-for-profit organization that will be soliciting private donations for the Village's Housing Assistance Program. The Housing Assistance Program helps needy seniors and disabled adults remain in Wilmette by providing financial assistance.

As discussed in prior issues of the Communicator, the Village's Housing Assistance Program is undergoing a transformation. An affordable housing escrow and other sources which have historically funded the program are running low on funds. Last year, the Village Board followed the recommendation of an ad hoc committee of residents and directed Staff to establish a non-profit organization to seek private donations to continue this important community program.

The new organization, Housing Our Own – Wilmette, has been established, and I would like to express my deep gratitude to the individuals who have volunteered to serve as the first board of directors: Michael Braiman, Nancy Canafax, Joan Criswell-Merrilees, Lisa Finks, Jolie Horen, Cameron Krueger, Michael Murdock, Walter Reed and John Thomason. I would especially like to thank Joan Criswell-Merrilees who has agreed to serve as President of the board. FLU VACCINES AVAILABLE

This fall, the seasonal influenza vaccine administration for Wilmette residents will be held on Thursday, October 15, 2015 from 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. on the second floor of the Village Hall. The flu shots will be given to those residents over the age of 18 years. Appointments are necessary and can be made by calling the Health Department at (847) 853-7507 or by email, baderd@wilmette.com.

The fee for the seasonal flu shot is \$25. The seasonal high-dose flu shot for those 65 years and over is \$30. Residents who have Medicare Part B as their primary insurer may choose to receive their immunization with Medicare paying the fee. Medicare will not pay the Village if you belong to an HMO.

Caution: The vaccine should not be taken if you have a known allergy to eggs or egg products, have a fever, or if you have previously experienced an allergic reaction to the vaccine.

HOLIDAY LIGHTS RECYCLING PROGRAM

The Village of Wilmette, in partnership with Elgin Recycling and the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC), will be accepting holiday lights for recycling from Monday, November 23, 2015 through Friday, January 29, 2016.

Holiday lights can be dropped off at the Wilmette Public Works Facility, located at 711 Laramie Avenue. The recycling boxes will be located in the visitor's parking lot, accessible 24 hours a day.

The recycling program will accept all holiday string lighting (all colors and lengths); includes:

- ★ Mini-lights (or Italian lights)
- ★ C7 lights
- ★ C9 lights
- ★ Rope lights
- ★ LED lights
- ★ Extension Cords

Garland, live greens, and wreaths are not accepted with this program. These items should be disposed of through the regular solid waste program. CHRISTMAS TREE COLLECTION

During the first two weeks in January, Advanced Disposal will collect Christmas trees for composting on Wednesdays. Please place your Christmas trees at the location of your regular recycling pickup. Residents with alley access should place trees in the alley to ensure timely collection. Only residents without alley access should place trees at the curb for collection. Trees must be devoid of any ornaments, tinsel, garland or plastic/fabric bag wrap. Other holiday decorations, such as wreaths and garland may be bagged with garbage and set out as refuse.

TIPS TO KEEP WILMETTE A PEDESTRIAN FRIENDLY COMMUNITY

For the Pedestrian

- ★ Always cross the road at a traffic signal, intersection or marked crosswalk.
- ★ Stop at the curb and look for a safe gap in traffic before stepping off of the curb. Do not dart into the street!
- ★ Don't assume the driver sees you. Make eye contact.
- ★ Pay attention when walking. Do not text or talk on a cell phone.
- ★ Wear light or reflective clothing if walking at night or early in the morning.

For the Driver:


- ★ Illinois law requires drivers to stop and yield to pedestrians within a marked crosswalk.
- ★ Always look for pedestrians, especially before turning.
- ★ If you see a pedestrian on the side of the road or approaching a crosswalk, slow down and be prepared to stop.
- ★ Never pass a car that is stopped at a crosswalk. There could be pedestrians crossing that you do not see.
- ★ Drive slowly in residential areas and in school speed zones.
- ★ Don't drive distracted! Texting while driving is against the law.

NEW DINING OPTIONS

Wilmette is enjoying an explosion of new dining options and welcoming back an old friend. It's tough to choose, so plan to try the two new Italian restaurants, two new bakeries, and two new taco eateries. **Gusto of Wilmette**, located at 1146 Wilmette Avenue is the first of these new restaurants to open. Gusto had a soft opening on September 16 and is already enjoying large crowds. The restaurant is described as Italian-American and will be open Monday through Sunday for dinner with space available for private events.

Napolita will be among a handful of restaurants in the Chicago area with an authentic pizza oven straight from Naples, Italy.

The sisters of **St. Roger Abbey** will be opening a gourmet patisserie at 1101 Central Avenue (formerly Heavenly Hearth bakery) later this year. The sisters have been a memorable vendor at Wilmette's French Market over the years. They have gained quite a following in Wilmette and feel our residents have been very supportive of their charitable work. We are very excited to welcome them to our community.

Wilmette will very soon be the home of the first **Gigi's Cupcakes** in Illinois. A local resident who visited Gigi's while living in Florida is bringing the franchise to Westlake Plaza. Check out **WilmetteBiz** on Facebook for a grand opening announcement, anticipated for early October.

Two new taco eateries have filed for permits with the Village. **Taco Lago** at Plaza del Lago will be a full-service sit down restaurant. They hope to open later this year.

Trendy Taco will occupy the former **Hotcakes Café** space at 1195 Wilmette Avenue left vacant by **Hotcakes'** move to a larger space at 1183 Wilmette Avenue earlier this year. **Trendy Taco** will be primarily a carry-out restaurant with a limited amount of seating.

Wilmette is also pleased to welcome back **A La Carte**, which will be operating a retail and limited service restaurant at Westlake Plaza.

The Health Department is offering the following programs for its residents:

Cholesterol and Glucose Screening

The Health Department is offering a Lipid Profile and Glucose screening for residents on Wednesdays, November 18, 2015 and January 13, 2016 from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. in the Training Room of the Village Hall. This screening is by appointment only and requires a 12 hour fast. The Lipid Profile includes tests for total cholesterol, HDL cholesterol, LDL cholesterol, Triglycerides, and HDL/LDL ratio. The glucose screening is for the detection of diabetes. The test requires blood drawn from the arm and the results are sent in the mail within 48 hours. The cost of this test is \$20.00.
