STORMWATER IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

Following five years of study, and an intensive public education campaign, the Wilmette Board of Trustees voted on April 17, 2018 to pursue a stormwater improvement project to address flooding issues for residents who live west of Ridge Road. Ultimately, the majority of the Board of Trustees voted to proceed with Neighborhood Storage improvements at an estimated cost between \$48-55 million.

The Village is working cooperatively with the Wilmette Park District, as well as the schools and other units of government whose assistance will be needed to complete this project, in order to ensure the underground storage improvements are implemented in a timely manner and in a way that maintains the character and quality of any affected parks or other public property.

To meet this goal the Village issued a Request for Proposals and received responses from seven firms, several of which teamed together because of the size of the project. After careful review of the proposals, staff interviewed three firms. The team of Christopher B. Burke Engineering, Ltd. (CBBEL) and Baxter and Woodman was selected based on their relevant experience, knowledge of the system, comprehensive scope of work and competitive fee.

CBBEL was the project manager during the initial hydraulic study. As its original developer, CBBEL has tremendous knowledge of Wilmette's storm sewer model and provided an option in their proposal to expand flood relief to underserved neighborhoods. This will be reviewed in detail during the preliminary engineering phase.

Preliminary engineering is underway. The project team held its first meeting with the Park District,

survey work began August 20, and a detailed project analysis and optimization is underway to ensure that the Neighborhood Storage project benefits are as inclusive as possible.


LEAF COLLECTION BEGINS OCTOBER 15

The Village's popular Leaf Collection Program will begin on October 15 and run through December 7, weather permitting. Residents who live on residential side streets are asked to rake leaves to the curb. Please avoid raking leaves onto the street until two days prior to your scheduled collection day to prevent the clogging of storm drains. Residents who live on arterial streets (Lake Avenue, Wilmette Avenue, Sheridan Road, Green Bay Road, Ridge Road, Skokie Boulevard, and Hibbard Road) should place leaves on the parkway behind the curb, not in the street, due to heavy traffic.

Leaves must be in a loose condition, not in bags or containers, for collection. Leaves should be piled directly in front of your home, taking care not to block access to driveways and fire hydrants.

Street parking will be prohibited on scheduled leaf collection days. "No-Parking" signs will be posted on each block with applicable collection dates. Leaf piles blocked by vehicles will be skipped, and the vehicle will be ticketed. Success of the leaf program relies on residents' understanding and support of parking restrictions.

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PRESIDENT'S LETTER

LETTER FROM VILLAGE PRESIDENT BOB BIELINSKI



This past summer, the Village's downtown area remained a vibrant place with crowded restaurants, special events, and new businesses. The 3rd year of the Summer Concert Series on the front lawn of Village Hall continued to be a tremendous success, and we look forward to seeing what next year will bring.

Village government is, at its core, a service organization that exists to provide critical municipal services to its residents, business owners, and visitors. The Village Staff is always looking for ways to improve service levels in an efficient manner and to upgrade Wilmette's municipal infrastructure in cost effective ways. These are key elements of keeping Wilmette a great place to live and do business. Below, I highlight two recent Village government initiatives which will contribute to the quality of life in our community.

WILMETTONOMICS

Economic development has been one of the Village's focuses since coming out of the Great Recession. While we continue to see new businesses open and existing ones prosper, the Village, in partnership with the Chamber of Commerce and marketing professionals who live in our community, has launched a grassroots marketing campaign aimed at supporting local businesses called *Wilmettonomics*.

What is Wilmettonomics? It's the 2% return on every dollar you spend locally that gets put back into the Village and helps keep Wilmette a special place. From keeping us safe with our exceptional Fire and Police Departments, to services like trash and recycling removal, to special events like our holiday lights and seasonal concerts. Each year, \$5.9 million of local spending dollars come right back into our community. Without it, we would not be able to fund street improvements, tree plantings, snow plowing, and much more without additional tax increases. Think of it this way: If you spend \$250 a month at Wilmette businesses - which could include dinner out, birthday presents, pet supplies and a daily coffee - that's \$3,000 a year. Approximately \$60 of that spending comes back to Wilmette. If 9,400 households spend this amount, it puts more than \$550,000 back into our community.

To put this into perspective, \$550,000 is the amount we spend each year on our annual alley maintenance program.

It's important for residents to understand that when the State of Illinois collects sales or use tax on purchases made online, it distributes those taxes differently so Wilmette does not benefit directly from purchases made by its residents.

But, shopping locally adds up and makes a real difference! That's Wilmettonomics.

Thousands of volunteer hours have been spent on this project by people who are passionate about seeing Wilmette continue to thrive, and we are excited to see these efforts come to life. I would like to personally thank everyone involved in making this campaign possible and encourage everyone to support our local businesses.

GRANT-FUNDED INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS

The Village continues to invest in its municipal infrastructure, and over the past several years, the Village has increased funding for roads, sidewalks, alleys, and sewers. You can read more about the upcoming sewer improvement project on page one in this issue of *The Communicator*.

Importantly, the Village has worked hard to leverage county, state and federal grant dollars to fund some of these critical infrastructure improvements. As a result of these efforts, there are significant projects underway which are funded with more than \$7 million in grants, instead of resident tax dollars.

The Locust Road project, which will begin in the spring, consists of a full road reconstruction including utility work and pedestrian safety and traffic calming improvements, such as widened sidewalks and curb bump-outs. The project limits run from Lake Avenue to Wilmette Avenue allowing students attending Wilmette Junior High School and Regina Dominican High School safer journeys to school. This project is expected to be completed early in 2020.

The Village is also preparing for the Central Avenue Reconstruction Project scheduled for 2020. The project includes pedestrian improvements at 11th Street and 8th Street, near Central Elementary School and downtown. The construction will be an opportunity to install needed upgrades while protecting trees and maintaining historic lighting that lends character to the area. It is still not too late to register your comments regarding the streetscape. Page three includes more information on the streetscape and a survey which you can complete.

Finally, I'd like to wish you and your family a happy and healthy last few months of the year. Please be sure to enjoy the many exciting events taking place in Wilmette this holiday season including the Chamber of Commerce's Fall Fest and Pumpkin Walk, Holiday Open House, and the Annual Tree Lighting ceremony.

PREVENTING BURGLARIES - LOCK YOUR DOORS

1. **Always make your home appear occupied.** Park cars in the driveway (especially when you're on vacation), and keep on lights at night, inside and outside. Have the TV or radio playing. Have mail and newspapers stopped or picked up. Arrange to have grass mowed or snow shoveled.
2. **Be over-zealous regarding locking up.** If you're outside or busy inside, keep your doors locked and garage door shut. Always lock the door from the garage into your house, too. Always take your vehicle's key and lock your vehicle.
3. **Never keep valuables in your car.** Car doors and trunks don't provide the security of a safe, even when locked. In particular, don't leave behind electronics or personal information; these could be used to steal your identity.



WASTE COLLECTION AND RECYCLING

CHRISTMAS TREE COLLECTION

During the first two weeks in January, Advanced Disposal will collect Christmas trees for composting on Wednesdays. Please place your Christmas trees at the location of your regular recycling pickup. Residents with alley access should place trees

in the alley to ensure timely collection. Only residents without alley access should place trees at the curb for collection. Trees must be free of any ornaments, tinsel, garland, and plastic/fabric bag wrap. Other holiday decorations, such as wreaths and garland, may be bagged with garbage and set out as refuse.



HOLIDAY LIGHTS RECYCLING PROGRAM

The Village of Wilmette, in partnership with Elgin Recycling and the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC), will accept holiday lights for recycling from November 19, 2018 through January 31, 2019.

Holiday lights can be dropped off at the Wilmette Public Works Facility, located at 711 Laramie Avenue. The recycling boxes will be located in the visitor's parking lot, accessible 24-hours a day.

The recycling program will accept holiday string lighting of all colors and lengths; includes:

- Mini-lights (or Italian lights)
- C7 lights
- C9 lights
- Rope lights
- LED lights
- Extension cords

Please remove lights from packaging and plastic bags! Garland, live greens, and wreaths are not accepted with this program. These items should be disposed of through the regular solid waste program.

WINTER HEATING SAFETY

As temperatures fall, the Wilmette Fire Department would like to share some winter safety tips from NFPA (National Fire Protection Association).

- Half of all home heating fires occur from December through February.
- Heating equipment is involved in one in every seven home fires and one in every five home deaths.
- Keep anything that can burn at least three feet from any heat source.
- Keep portable generators outside, away from windows, and as far away as possible from your home.
- Install and test carbon monoxide alarms at least once a month.
- Have a qualified professional clean and inspect your chimney and vents every year.
- Store cooled ashes in a tightly covered metal container, and keep the ash container outside at least 10 feet from your home.
- Plug only one heat-producing appliance (such as a space heater) into an electrical outlet at a time.

- Monday, December 17, 2018 **from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.**

The number of ballots cast in the April 4, 2017 Consolidated General Election was 5,486.

The Illinois State Board of Elections has prepared the *Candidate's Guide for 2019*, to provide information for candidates seeking public office. It provides information on the proper completion and filing of nomination papers and lists the qualifications required for candidates seeking specific offices. *The Candidate's Guide for 2019* is available through the Illinois State Board of Elections in Chicago by calling 312-814-6440 or through the agency's website elections.il.gov.

Legal information contained on this notice is not binding. The Village of Wilmette recommends that all prospective candidates consult with competent legal counsel when preparing their nomination papers.



EARLY VOTING

Illinois voters may vote early – before the November 6 Gubernatorial Election – without needing a reason or excuse to do so. Registered voters can vote early from October 22 through November 5. The times and locations will be determined by the Cook County Clerk and posted on their website cookcountyclerk.com.

By law, individuals who vote early must display a government-issued photo identification (driver's license, state identification card or passport) before receiving a ballot.

Any registered suburban Cook County voter may request a mail ballot using the Cook County Clerk's online application found on their website, cookcountyclerk.com.
