McDonald's Proposal Environmental Impact

# **Background**

Trustee Gjaja has asked the Sustainability Coordinator to provide a report of the environmental impacts of a McDonald's drive-through at 200 Skokie Boulevard.

At the November 6, 2023 Zoning Board of Appeals Public Hearing concerning the McDonald's Special Use application, Chris Stepp, Area Construction Manager for McDonalds, estimated that the proposed McDonalds location would generate approximately 1,000 transactions per day, with 75% of these transactions occurring in the drive through. He also projected an average wait time of 3.5 minutes for drive-through customers.

### Discussion

To better understand the potential environmental impact of a McDonald's drive-through, Illinois vehicle data was analyzed based on 2022 data from the US Department of Energy's Alternative Fuel Data Center. The breakdown of vehicle types and their respective percentages in the state are as follows:

Type of Vehicle	Number of Cars in Illinois	Percentage of Total
Electric	66,900	0.67%
Hybrid (Plug-in and not)	269,800	2.7%
Gasoline	8,606,400	85.7%
Diesel	171,300	1.7%
Ethanol/Flex	807,900	8.1%
Biodiesel	55,400	0.55%
Unknown	59,500	0.59%

Additionally, according to the US Department of Energy and the US Energy Information Administration, different fuel types emit varying amounts of carbon when burned:

- Gasoline: 20 lbs of carbon per gallon
- Diesel: 22 lbs of carbon per gallon
- Ethanol/Flex: 18 lbs of carbon per gallon
- Biodiesel: 18 lbs of carbon per gallon

Considering a typical wait time of 3.5 minutes in the drive-through and the average fuel consumption rate of cars in the US at idle (0.01925 gallons in 3.5 minutes according to the US Department of Energy), carbon emissions per vehicle type are as follows:

Gasoline	0.385 lbs	247.555 lbs

Biodiesel	0.3465 lbs	1.386 lbs
Unknown	N/A	N/A

<sup>\*</sup>Emissions data varies depending on outdoor air temperature and indoor car temperature.

The cumulative impact of the emissions from the proposed McDonald's location equals about 275 pounds of carbon per day, translating to an estimated 100,461 pounds of carbon per year (365 days). According to the US EPA's Greenhouse Gas Equivalencies Calculator, this annual carbon emission is equivalent to the carbon dioxide emissions from the annual energy use of 21 homes and the greenhouse gas emissions equivalent to 428,329 miles being driven by an average gasoline-powered passenger vehicle. This is the same amount of emissions sequestered annually by 199 acres of forest.

An idling vehicle releases a mix of different gasses and particles, including but not limited to, nitrogen  $(N_2)$ , carbon dioxide  $(CO_2)$ , nitrogen oxides (NOx), carbon monoxide (CO), sulfur dioxide  $(SO_2)$  and fine particulates (PM2.5), many of which have harmful health effects. Vulnerable populations, such as children, the elderly, and individuals with respiratory conditions, face heightened risks from exposure to these pollutants. Children, in particular, are more susceptible because they breathe in 50 percent more air per pound of body weight than adults.

I read with surprise that the Zoning Commission approved a McDonalds location on Old Glenview Road and Skokie Blvd. 4 to 3. I strongly urge the Village Board to oppose this McDonalds.

Traffic and undesirable chains are a problem. Notably, the Village has never been able to solve the traffic from Starbucks on Lake by the DQ. Every school day with Loyola in session traffic is back-uped from west of the Edens.. It is not safe and a burden. A McDonalds on Glenview Road will be worse, and worse all day and evening.

A McDonad's in Wilmette anywhere is highly undesirable, dirty, smelly, unsafe, and busy. Your possible approval smacks and strokes of the long division between west Wilmette and east.

There is no way the Board would ever approve McDonald's for plaza del lago, or Greenbay Road from Isabella to Lake, or Ridge at Wilmette Ave, so that it is even up for debate that this is or should be ok or good enough for those in west Wilmette is deeply offensive. Upon attending the Wilmette Zoning Board of Appeals meeting on Wednesday, I was saddened that the approval by the zoning BOD, although close, was in favor of the McDonald's application to build a Drive-thru and sit-down restaurant at 200 Skokie Blvd. Just north of the Old Glenview Road and Skokie Blvd. intersection.


One of the topics brought to light was the lack of sufficient parking at our Facility. The attached diagram indicates specifically and thoroughly what the residents at Mather must maneuver around on a daily basis to walk safely in our parking lot and upon exiting our premise onto Old Glenview Road..

In addition to the volume and tight space to park, deliver and service Mather, the thru traffic, indicated by blue arrows, is a **major** safety issue. Two of our residents narrowly escaped being hit by thru traffic by cars taking a short-cut to the shopping mall. This proposal includes putting signage to indicate "No left hand turn" and "No right hand turn" facing East and West near the Mather entrance.

Once walkers exit the property onto Old Glenview Road (the entrance is a mere 300 feet from the intersection) there is no indication of a crosswalk, and there is no stop sign that says "stop when pedestrians are present." (This is an approved state sign and was specifically enacted when pedestrians were killed on Central Street in Evanston two years ago.)


The attachment shows the changes we feel should be installed for our elderly residents' safety.

# To The Wilmette Village Board:

We are concerned residents for all of Wilmette and the negative effects of Drive Through restaurants in our community. Mc Donalds wanting to open at 200 Skokie Rd. can be just the start, when we open the door, others may follow.

The concerns are many as The McDonalds Reps. shared that there can be up to 1000 cars per day, at 3 -5 minutes in line and the amount of idling can create greenhouse gas, carbon dioxide, nitrous oxide and methane gases all day and night. My understanding is that Wilmette's local government is a **leader** in striving for advanced sustainability as climatic change rages on.

McDonalds shared that this site would be open 19 1/2 hours a day 7 days a week, starting at 5:30 a.m till 1:00 am, how disruptive would that be to the tax paying residents on all 3 sides of this property? My understanding is this property is Zoned as Neighborhood Retail and McDonalds is looking to change the zoning with variants.

I feel this not a case of "Something is better then nothing" we lived in harmony with Bakers Square, which everyone in Wilmette could enjoy, we feel there is a business that can match the unique qualities of the village that we are.

There are other deeper concerns, but I want to share these listed below as a start: I so appreciate your time, I am hopeful you will consider the deep concerns of our community in regards to this property.

Thank You, Carla Lieberman 204 Sunset Drive McDonald's, like many fast-food chains, can have several potential negative impacts on a residential community:

- 1. Traffic and congestion: Increased traffic around a McDonald's location can cause congestion on nearby roads, especially during peak hours. This can lead to noise, pollution, and safety concerns for pedestrians and drivers in the area.
- 2. Noise pollution: The operation of a fast-food restaurant like McDonald's often involves continuous noise from delivery trucks, drive-thru speakers, kitchen equipment, and customers, which can disturb the peace and quiet of a residential neighborhood.
- 3. Waste and litter: Fast-food restaurants generate a significant amount of waste, including packaging materials, disposable containers, and wrappers. Improper disposal or inadequate waste management can lead to littering in the community, affecting the aesthetic appeal and cleanliness of the area.
- 4. Health concerns: Some residents might be concerned about the impact of fast food on public health. McDonald's and similar establishments offer food that tends to be high in calories, fat, sugar, and sodium, contributing to health issues like obesity and related conditions among community members.
- 5. Property values: Some studies have proven that proximity to fast-food restaurants like McDonald's will have a negative impact on property values in a residential area due to perceived drawbacks such as increased noise, traffic, and concerns about health effects. Our homes are our saving plans as we age.
- 6. Business competition: Local small businesses might face challenges when a large fast-food chain like McDonald's moves into the area. It can lead to increased competition, potentially affecting the viability of smaller, independently-owned restaurants.
- 7. Parking: The math doesn't add up...McDonalds mentioned 12-15 workers each shift, the site has 28 parking spots and has a sit down restaurant, do they really believe 13 open spaces will fit the needs of those eating in? There is no street parking, it is too small of a lot and not enough parking.

### Dear Wilmette Board of Trustees:

We as residents are concerned over the possibility of a McDonald's at 200 Skokie Boulevard. I was extremely disappointed by the Zoning Boards

recommendation after receiving 175 petitions from neighbors. It barely passed as a recommendation since one abstained and then later felt he had to vote yes.

Our concerns were not addressed by McDonald's. In my opinion, some of McDonald's responses for Special Use, Section 30-5.3.E, were boiler plate/hypothetical answers and not relevant to our neighborhood or village. Three of the Zoning Board members also agreed. McDonald's

representative mentioned to the zoning board that they cannot decline them special use because of a drive thru. However, we should be able to not approve them because of the negative impacts a drive-thru brings to our neighborhood and community such as:

# Sustainability/Air pollution and Safety (b & c):

Environmental (17), Health (18). I'm thankful to live in a village that is committed to sustainability as I'm a member of the National Wildlife Federation and my yard is also certified. I've also agreed to switch to the new electric company as well as other Wilmette programs.

McDonald's stated at the meeting that an estimate of 1,000 cars would go through this lot. 80% will be drive thru. 800 cars idling. This is an estimate. I've heard that on a bad day it is closer to 1,200 car per day impacting our West side neighborhoods and all of Wilmette. This is not meeting our commitments to reducing pollution. This lot shares a fence that divides 50% of the lot with neighbors' backyards.

There will be 2 lanes of traffic that will be 10 feet from properties lines/backyards impacting health. We will no longer be able to enjoy our properties/backyards with a drive thru having 800-960 vehicles daily idling and 1,000-1,200 daily through this lot.

There is a significant difference between having the largest fast-food chain in the US & world versus a Bakers Square or Caddy Shack in our neighborhood. I understand Starbucks drive-thru was approved but that was prior to the 2021 Sustainability plan and commitment to our community. We can't allow this magnitude of a restaurant and set precedent for future establishments in our community as this does not reduce congestion or reduce pollution. McDonald's drive thru does not align with Wilmette Green Initiatives/Wilmette's Greenest Region Compact (GRC2 Sustainability Plan 2021. I've attached additional information referencing organizations and data on pollution. I would also ask the EEC's expertise on this topic.

# Property Values (e):

McDonald's states this will have a **positive influence/beneficial** to property values. How can putting the largest fast-food chain increase my property value or surrounding neighborhood? Not in Wilmette. Maybe in a depressed community that has an empty lot. Having a vacant lot in Wilmette is more favorable than having a McDonald's drive-thru fast food. There is a drastic difference versus Baker Square or Caddyshack. This will set a precedent again and will continue to impact our property values. I've invested a significant amount of money in remodeling my home and I wouldn't have imagined that my Wilmette home would go down in value. Residents including elderly residents who have invested their savings in their homes, will face a severe depreciation in their investments. It is not right to impact a critical investment like our homes. According to one study out of the UK living near a McDonald's devalues nearby home prices by nearly

# Character of the Village(h):

This is zoned Neighborhood Retail. This is a different use not like Bakers Square or Caddyshack. This will change the character of the neighborhood and Village. Once again, there is no comparison going from Baker Square or Caddyshack to the largest fast food Chain Restaurant in the world that has primarily 80% drive- thru. It doesn't fit in our neighborhood. There are other restaurants that fit in our neighborhood and also not impact small businesses. The owner of this lot has had other interested parties but had already signed a contract with McDonald's.

# Congestion/Traffic:

Traffic Study was conducted on Nov. 11th, 2022, Veterans Day and on Nov. 19th, 2022, weekend before Thanksgiving. This is when there is less traffic.

Wilmette Greenest Region Compact (Sustainability Plan 2021), to reduce congestion.

This also doesn't align with Wilmette's Traffic Calming Policy.

# Noise:

I understand a restaurant will come with some noise as did Bakers Square. However, the level of noise, 5:30am – 1:00am hours and lighting would be a huge impact to our quality of life.

We appreciate Wilmette Board fighting for the Wilmette residents due to noise pollution from Ryan Field. We would appreciate the same consideration since the car drive-thru noise, music, pollution and lights will affect our neighborhood and quality of life. Wilmette Village Board adopts objection to Ryan Field concerns.

Just wanted to thank you again for directing me to the specific discussion. I have to say, I don't find the arguments 'for' the proposition particularly compelling - seems like they're simply saying "I hear the local residents but I don't care". To compare that stretch of Skokie Blvd with being "near Old Orchard" so what can residents expect was particularly dismissive. The traffic and idling, noise/light pollution and safety concerns of pedestrians seem very different than if this were a family/sit-down restaurant (like Caddyshack was to be).

I certainly hope the VB takes into account some of the concerns even those who voted in favor took - e.g., delivery start times in the early morning, as well as the articulated concerns of those who voted against, and clearly the residents' needs.

Dear Village Trustees, Village President Plunkett and Village Manager Braiman,

I am very sorry to have missed the Zoning Board meeting last week, as I was out of town. I was extremely disappointed to learn that the special use McDonald's request was approved by the Board.

Looking at the meeting packet, there seem to be a lot of unanswered questions in addition to all the concerns previously raised. In addition to general concerns about increased traffic in a residential neighborhood, there is also expected noise from delivery trucks, HVAC systems, drive-thru ordering systems as well as new likely unattractive signage and way-finding. Further, reviewing the discussion of drive-thru car stacking, it wasn't clear whether they had assessed the pollution levels resulting from idling cars.

The packet included community letters and to say that those opposed to this outweigh those in support is a dramatic understatement -- the community, and particularly those who live nearby DO NOT want this establishment in their neighborhood. Additionally, with the number of elderly folks living at Mather walking along Old Glenview Road, there is a very real risk of accidents and injury, as there are no easy places to cross that street, except at the 2 major intersections. Clearly, local residents are not excited about the ability to 'walk to McDonald's'. I didn't see a lot (any) of that sentiment. I am hoping that all of these letters will again be in the Village Board packet for review before the VB meeting on this topic.

The article in The Record indicated that the Zoning Board was aware of the community concerns about noise, pollution, traffic and safety -- all of which seem like significant concerns. I would be very interested to hear the discussion, if the meeting was recorded. Absent that - perhaps you can illuminate me (and others) on what prompted them to approve this. I will note again - there are several fast-food establishments in West Wilmette (Dunkin', Irvings, DQ, Five Guys, Panda Express, etc)... all of which are in established shopping centers - not stand-along in homeowners' backyards.

I now urge the full Board to reject this proposal and I hope this will get discussion at the 1/9/24 Board meeting.

Thank you for considering the community's best interests, with some specific attention to desires of West Wilmette residents.

I am writing this note in opposition to providing McDonald's with a license to operate its restaurant and drive-thru in the former Baker's Square location on Old Glenview Road/Skokie Blvd.

As a resident of the general area surrounding this location, I was excited when there were plans to move ahead with a family-oriented, sit-down restaurant with good food and a nice environment. Additionally, the knowledge that the proposed restaurant was owned by people with local ties to the community was important as they would work to ensure they retained the local feel and vibe of the neighborhood. A McDonald's + Drive-Thru is the polar opposite of this! I am supportive of (actually would be excited about) a restaurant in this location, but a McDonald's Restaurant, particularly with a Drive-Thru, is not what this neighborhood needs.

This is a little carved-out commercial corner of a residential neighborhood - with homes abutting it and residential communities surrounding it. 

We have been residents of Wilmette for almost forty years at 205 Sunset Drive. Our backyard borders and overlooks the proposed McDonald's Drive-Thru restaurant. At the zoning board meeting on December 6th, the board voted 4 to 3 in favor of the variance, with a last minute board member changing his vote from abstaining to approving the variance if the hours were changed from closing at 1:30 am to 10 pm at night.

A representative from McDonald's stated that changing the height of the fence from six to eight feet would meet the requirements for blocking the headlights of cars. A board member commented that he wasn't concerned about the headlights. Another board member was in favor of closing at 10pm "because noone wants to see the lights when they sleep." There was no discussion of opening McDonald's at 5:30am during sleeping hours. Delivery time was addressed; however, there was no decision.

McDonald's representative mentioned that the property would be more desirable with their proposed landscaping. A board member then suggested that instead of deciduous trees, Evergreen Trees would block the headlights of cars. The deciduous trees do not provide adequate privacy as tall Evergreen trees. "I understand that your repeatedly say you meet the requirements it would be nice if you exceeded the requirements to satisfy the neighbors." McDonald's representative replied, "we will work with the neighbors as issues arise and we will address the neighbors' concerns as best as possible." Isn't it the Board of Trustees of Wilmette, representing the neighbors best interests establish requirements regarding the fence and tall Evergreens? These issues must be resolved before and not after possible approval. Attached are photos that show the neighbors proximity and view from the entire north and west

borders of the proposed McDonald's Drive-Thru site. We're requesting the Wilmette Village Board of Trustees address the fence height. The Wilmette Jewel on Green Bay Road has a 12' fence separating the neighbors of East Wilmette from the commercial property. This sets a precedent for the neighbors who are in direct proximity to the proposed Drive-Thru.



First of all, thank you for your service to the community

During our 43 years as a Wilmette resident, we have seen the city center transform to what it is today. A vibrant dining establishment that was nurtured by the village to help create what has become a popular and welcoming retreat for the community. We applaud this. The vision to mesh living and retail together, with each being considered during the process, was well done.

We mention this because this transformation would not have occurred without the village board's support and vision. It is appropriate and welcomed, that this has occurred. The downtown area should be for shopping, dining and gathering. For those that live in and near downtown, it is expected that the city center will have more activity.

Throughout the village the other retail spots tend to be separated from residential areas and are situated on their own. Meaning not adjacent to residential homes, like the site on Skokie Blvd and Old Glenview Road. Plaza del Lago, Westlake, Edens Plaza to name a few are not backing up to residential houses. And none have long hours that the McDonalds (up to 19 hours a day) will have.

Also, no other business has a drive thru window in the village. In fact, I do not believe there is a drive thru McDonalds (or any fast food) in Kenilworth, Winnetka (the McDonalds there does NOT have a drive thru nor back up to residential property), or Glencoe, our neighboring villages.

The location of the closed Bakers Square restaurant, is basically a standalone unit nestled in the middle of townhomes and free-standing homes. Allowing a retail fast food establishment with heavy traffic, drive through and long hours, approximately 5 am to 12 midnight of activity, is not anything that anyone would want to live nearby. I ask, would you want this next to your home? While you cannot stop development just because you don't like something, if it is within the law, but allowing a variance for a project that the community (taxpayers) do not want, and reject, is just plain not right.

Wilmette has been priding itself on more and more green initiatives within the community. Adding a high volume business with many idling cars emitting car fumes is not part of our mission statement.

What I found in the last 3 to 4 years with the building of Mather Place and the second edition, it is created a lot of problems on my block on Sunset Dr. The zoning board did not do their due diligence when the second addition went in and they forced Mather to purchase parking from the Commons shopping center. If you ever drive by the shopping center early in the morning you'll see that the parking lot is completely full. If they did not

do that, they would be taking parking spaces up throughout the neighborhood on Glenview Road and Sunset Drive.

This month alone there have been three accidents in front of Baker Square on Skokie Boulevard. You could easily look that up we have pictures from our community of these accidents and this is before Wayfair comes in, the expansion of old Orchard and the proposed 1000 to 1200 cars a day into McDonald's. Half of those cars will be from the expressway with people that have one thing on their mind to get a quick meal and exit back to the expressway. There is a religious temple not far from there, the recreational center, and Mather place that has people from 70 years old to 100 that lived there that are nervous about walking around that area as they testified during the zoning commission. One of the people that abstained told the story that his brother got killed on a bike and he had reservations coming into the meeting on to vote on it. Even the chairman said the same thing said he was on the fence.

Personally, there are a number of us that will not stay and we will sell our houses and move in my opinion and I'm one of them. These same valid points were made in 1985 in East Wilmette, and the board agreed. I am urging you to act on behalf of the residents that will be most affected with the same unanimous vote that the board took against the NU stadium expansion. The 'profiteering' as you put it is the same for both issues. McDonalds has the most valuable real estate portfolio in the world - \$40B. All I keep hearing is that this comes down to dollars and cents, but I am curious about how this supposed influx would trickle down to Wilmette. Is selling out to this corporation worth the community damage in the long run? Despite all of this sentiment, this really comes down to being consistent with the ordinances and variances already in place. Making this special use exemption for a drive thru fast food restaurant will be a trojan horse for additional drive-thru's in this community. No 'neighborhood retail' designated area is safe and you will have invalidated its intent.

Finally, I have major concerns with the traffic study presented at the previous meeting. Upon review of the traffic study by a Transportation Demand Consultant who reviews traffic studies as part of her duties her notes are below (she will submit a statement if needed):

- -There is absolutely no way they can say that a new fast food restaurant will have no impact on the adjacent roadway, therefore exempting them from having to make any improvements...No way.
- -The way they're doing the traffic impact analysis is a bit old school too the new way of thinking is NOT to use "level of service " to evaluate an intersection because it inherently allows for delays (how long you'll have to wait in the number of seconds) and then forces intersection widening to reduce the delay.
- -the traffic counts are a year old, too...not sure if things have changed in the past year, as we get further out of the pandemic.
- -they can't expect people to digest traffic counts in a table format.
- -another problem with traffic studies- they can't take into account all of the other developments

happening (Chabad, Funeral home) then the city gets stuck with a corridor that needs improvements.

- -Demand that the city require all those developers to collectively fund a corridor study by a third party traffic engineer.
- an inherent problem with those traffic impact studies- as the traffic engineer, your client is the McDonald's and even though they don't tell you to skew it so they don't have to do any improvements, you know that's what they want.
- -they should possibly make other improvements at the access points, or be required to put in a dedicated right turn lane into the lot, etc.

Dear Members of the Board

I am writing to express my opposition to the McDonald's application. Approving this request will be a repudiation of the Village's Standards for Special Use Ordinance as well as the Comprehensive Plan and The Sustainability Plan. Wilmette is a member of the "Climate Mayors" organization of 500 American cities engaged in action to combat climate change. Please do not open the flood gates to other fast food Drive-Thru chains who will rely on this precedence to invade the village of Wilmette.

Wilmette Sustainability Plan Page 54 states: "The window for moderate climate action has closed".... local action is essential. Cities control up to 70% of energy emissions and are ground zero for climate hazards" Time is running out, as our trustees you must take forceful action now to mitigate climate change. Wilmette's Air Quality Index on most days this past summer was high in the danger zone. A polluting Drive-Thru anywhere within the Village limits should not be allowed.

# Village Standards for special use 30-5.3.E

A. The proposed use in the specific location is consistent with the goals and policies of the Comprehensive Plan: Gidon Eshel, professor of environmental research at Bard College says: "... McDonald's business is at odds with the Earth's integrity." McDonald's require the slaughter of 7 million cattle each year. The cost to the environment in 2019 was estimated to be more than 53m metric tons of greenhouse gas exceeding combined emissions of several European nations. This is incompatible with Wilmette's Comprehensive plan to improve air quality by reducing pollutants and greenhouse gas emissions.

B. The operation of the proposed use in the specific location will not be detrimental to or endanger the public health, safety and welfare

<u>Health:</u> SeeLevel HX a leading customer experience agency sent mystery shoppers to visit 1,492 Drive-Thrus. More than half were lunch time orders. They found that the average total time spent in the drive-thru lane is nearly 6.4 min. In general an idling car emits about 1 pound of CO2 per 10 minutes. Thus, **1000 c**ars a day expected at the Drive-Thru, (4 times more than a sit down restaurant) will emit roughly 640 pounds of carbon dioxide and pose a danger to the health of residents. This does not bode well to Wilmette's Sustainability Strategic Plan.

<u>Safety:</u> A 2016 study by the University of Texas found that crime rates were higher in a Drive-Thru area increasing incidents of robbery, aggravated assault, and property vandalism.

Also to be considered is the constant flow of cars which will overwhelm the community. It will impact the ease of movement and cause longer commuting times. Traffic exiting the Drive-Thru will overflow into Old Glenview Road, Sunset drive and Westmoreland as Drivers will find it hard to turn south. East bound drivers on Glenview Rd will use these streets to detour the intersection at Old Glenview and Skokie Blvd. which will back up with traffic.

The 25 families in Charles Place and the Point-Town-Homes plus visitors and service vehicles using the access driveways will be at risk. Three accidents occurred just this month of December on the 200 block of Skokie Blvd near the proposed Drive-Thru. On The 13<sup>th</sup>, the 18<sup>th</sup> and the 23<sup>rd</sup> the number of accidents would rise exponentially if the Drive-Thru is approved.

Welfare: The neighborhood will lose a quaint residential character in favor of a busy commercial establishment suited for an interstate highway. Quality of life will be adversely affected by air pollution and noise from cars, loud speakers and teenagers hanging around the site. Food packaging and wrappers are sure to litter and pollute our environment and glaring vehicle lights will invade our homes. All of this will diminish resident's enjoyment of their homes and backyards. McDonald's pulled back its proposal for a Drive-Thru at 2500 Gross Point Road in Evanston after residents cited in protest these very same reasons.

# E. The proposed use in the specific location will not substantially diminish property values in the neighborhood.

Real estate agents regularly emphasize that safety and security profoundly impact property values. Homes near a Drive-Thru will experience challenges in attracting buyers who prioritize neighborhoods with low crime rates and good safety measures. High crime rates and a reputation for being unsafe lead to decreased property values.

H. The proposed use in the specific location will be consistent with the community character of the neighborhood of the parcel proposed for the special use.

Village President, Senta Plunkett, argued before the Evanston City Council that the Ryan Field proposal is "a gross infringement upon the quiet enjoyment of Wilmette residents' property and it will change forever the character of this residential neighborhood." In the same spirit it is crucial for the Board to also preserve the existing fabric of our community. This site lends itself to a low key sit down restaurant not a 1000 cars per day Drive-Thru.

In conclusion I would like to point out that our area is not a fast food desert and a Drive-Thru at this location does not satisfy a great public need. One mile or so to the South there is a commercial area with several Drive-Thrus: Portillo, Chipotle, Jimmy John's, Culvers, Chick-Fil-A and Wendy's. At Eden's Plaza we have Panda Express, Five Guys and Irving's. There is also a McDonald's Drive Thru 2 miles north on Skokie Blvd. In the past Wilmette has denied a McDonald's application for a drive thru on 825 Green Bay Rd. (Case1985-Z-14). The Board should extended the same considerations to our neighborhood.

Please bear in mind Abraham Lincoln's immortal words "You cannot escape the responsibility of tomorrow by evading it today". I hope you will conclude that this application must be denied.

Dear Village Trustees,

I am writing to you to express my strong opposition to the proposal to approve a McDonalds Restaurant on the former Bakers Square Restaurant property located in the 200 block of Skokie Blvd. I am the owner of a townhouse on the west side of Skokie Blvd., directly across the street from the proposed restaurant. Thus, my kitchen and bedroom windows directly face the property. I submitted a letter which was part of the packet provided to the zoning board in advance of their December meeting and presented public comments at that meeting regarding safety concerns associated with a high volume drive through restaurant. In this follow-up letter, I specifically wish to address sustainability and neighborhood character concerns as addressed in the recently released Wilmette Comprehensive Plan which was approved by the Plan Commission at their December 19<sup>th</sup> meeting and forwarded to you for approval.

As you know, the 2021 Wilmette Sustainable Communities Strategic Plan (SCSP) calls for the village to reduce Greenhouse Gas emissions 45% from 2010 levels by 2030 and to reach net zero emissions by 2050. The plan also calls for the village to reduce practices that negatively impact air quality, to establish a policy to consider the sustainability impact of every governmental decision, and to reduce the generation of waste. A two lane drive through McDonalds with 1000 cars per day emitting exhaust fumes (per McDonalds's stated estimate at the December Zoning Board meeting) will certainly not represent a sustainable choice for our community.

I wish to further point to statements in the Wilmette Comprehensive Plan which further support my opposition to a drive through McDonalds in west Wilmette. Page 51 of the plan (Chapter Five, Sustainability) states the following: "Likewise, there is an expectation that the local government advance sustainability efforts to lead by example, work in coordination with local organizations, and keep sustainable practices, incentives, and policies front of mind." In the chart on page 53 of the Comprehensive Plan, which summarizes opportunities for overlap between the Sustainability Plan and the Comprehensive Plan, the bullet point under Economic Development states "Attract and retain businesses that practice and promote sustainability." The bullet point under Waste and Recycling states "Reduce generation of all waste types"

Thus, in response to these statements, I ask that you keep sustainability practices front of mind when considering the proposal by McDonalds, which will harm rather than enhance local sustainability practices. Approving a business such as a high volume two lane drive through McDonalds restaurant will certainly not be a decision which promotes sustainability. Furthermore, regarding the goal of reducing waste, McDonalds uses exclusively paper products for the packaging of their food, leading to significant solid waste and litter.

Additionally, the Comprehensive Plan specifically further lays out goals and objectives regarding sustainability including the following:

Goal #4 (pg. 57): "A community with limited negative impact on the climate and high resilience to climate changes":

- Objective One: Reach net zero greenhouse gas emissions as a community by 2050, as stated in the Wilmette SCSP
- Objective Two: Engage with residents and businesses to increase energy efficiency
- Objective Six: Review the Village Building Code and look for opportunities to tie climate mitigation measures and sustainable practices to building code regulations for new construction

With response to engaging with residents and businesses to increase energy efficiency, the McDonalds proposal has generated a high volume of letters and petition signatures opposing approval, specifically around the poor level of energy efficiency such a restaurant would represent. A high volume primarily drive through restaurant open 19.5 hours daily would be a business that would have a negative impact on the climate, in opposition to Goal #4 regarding sustainability. This property is zoned Neighborhood/Retail. Allowing a drive through restaurant, including the accompanying exhaust fumes, ordering kiosks, litter, and noise pollution would not mitigate climate concerns, particularly for those living immediately adjacent to the proposed restaurant.

Chapter Nine of the Comprehensive Plan (Business and Commerce) references specific goals which have relevance to the proposed McDonalds drive through restaurant:

- Goal 2 (Economic Development)/Item #2 (pg. 113): "Regularly engage with the public to understand their desires and report back community sentiment to economic development stakeholders"
- Goal 3 (Business Districts)/Item #4 (pg. 113): "Reuse (or redevelopment) should be sensitive to the character of the surrounding area and community settlement, and should result in acceptable levels of environmental, traffic, fiscal, and public service impact."

We appreciate the many opportunities to engage with you and to share our sentiments opposing a drive through McDonalds. In addition to sustainability, traffic, noise, and safety, concerns, which have been primary, we also possess significant concern about how a McDonalds restaurant would impact the character of the village. At the zoning board meeting, McDonalds representatives stated that the presence of a McDonalds typically raises the property values of a community. This would not be the case in Wilmette, an affluent community which prides itself on its small town charm. Consultation with real estate


professionals indicates that property values would decline for those homes in the vicinity of this property if a McDonalds drive through restaurant is approved. The village has proudly touted the arrival of Wayfair to our community and the fact that Wilmette was chosen as the first community outside of the East Coast in which to locate a Wayfair store. Can the same be said for approval of a McDonalds drive through restaurant which proposes to be open 19.5 hours daily? Will you proudly announce to surrounding North Shore communities that Wilmette has made an exception to their zoning regulations to secure a drive through McDonalds? Please also keep in mind the precedent this will create. Will a Taco Bell soon be located at Plaza del Lago or a drive through Burger King in downtown Wilmette? This decision represents your legacy to our community. I urge you to oppose McDonalds in their effort to build a drive through restaurant in the 200 block of Skokie Blvd. Thank you for your consideration.

#### **Dear Village Board President and Village Trustees:**

I am writing to express my strong opposition to the proposed McDonald's drive-thru at 200 Skokie Boulevard, zoned *Neighborhood Retail* lot, as a proud homeowner and resident of Wilmette.

Accordingly, I hereby submit the following written comments for the record.

I oppose the McDonald's petition to operate a drive thru limited-service restaurants due to the following reasons:

- Zoning: 200 Skokie Boulevard is zoned Neighborhood Retail not zoned for a limited-service restaurant or a drive-thru. Approving this application would contradict existing zoning regulations. It would require two special use exceptions, which would essentially rezone the property, and approval will certainly result in legal challenges if approved.
- Sustainability: this proposal directly conflicts with Wilmette's Greenest Region Compact Sustainability Plan
  and the growing movement across North America to combat climate change by reducing air pollution
  from fast-food drive-thrus.
  - o (see <a href="https://iopscience.iop.org/article/10.1088/2752-5309/ace5cb/pdf">https://iopscience.iop.org/article/10.1088/2752-5309/ace5cb/pdf</a> "In addition, a range of fields have tackled this interdisciplinary problem. As a clear consensus has emerged, there appears to be a strong relationship between pollution generated by idling (Kinsey et al 2007, Richmond-Bryant et al 2009, Kim et al 2014, Lee et al 2018), interventions to reduce idling (Eghbalnia et al 2013, Meleady et al 2017, Mahmood et al 2019, Rumchev et al 2021), and the resulting impacts of idling on human health (Ryan et al 2013, Lynn et al 2014).")
- Health: Illinois Constitution Article XI states that each person has a right to a healthy environment. Adding idling cars, each emitting a pound of carbon dioxide and other harmful chemicals next door to resident's homes is endangering our health
- Approving this application would directly contradict the Village's decision to oppose the Ryan Field project as "a gross infringement upon the quiet enjoyment of Wilmette residents' property and will forever change the character of the residential neighborhood"
- Precedent: approving this application with special use permits will set a precedent for future limited-service drive-thru establishments on property zoned Neighborhood Retail, and of course properties zoned Commercial, leading to legal challenges the Village will likely lose if the special use exceptions aren't approved on the fast-food drive thrus that follow McDonald's to Wilmette.
  - If this dual-lane drive-thru establishment averaging over 1,000 cars per day is approved despite concerns about health, sustainability, pollution, safety, traffic, and other issues, the Village would be setting a dangerous precedent. Approving this application grants McDonalds special use exceptions that could be used by other drive-thru establishments like White Castle, Burger King, Arby's, or any other entity, leading to legal challenges if such applications are subsequently denied based on zoning regulations

- Traffic: substantially increase vehicular traffic flows in the affected area
  - The estimated 1,000 cars per day (based on McDonald's sponsored traffic study conducted on interestingly Nov. 11th, 2022, Veterans Day and on Nov. 19th, 2022, weekend before Thanksgiving) would significantly increase traffic flow, accidents, and pedestrian safety concerns.
  - Drivers waiting at the Old Glenview and Skokie Blvd intersection would create congestion and hinder traffic flow.
  - Drivers turning left from Skokie into the proposed site will cause accidents
  - o Drivers leaving the McDonalds attempting to turn left onto Skokie will similarly cause many accidents.
  - In the month of December 2023 there were at least 3 car accidents on the above-mentioned intersection, adding 1,000 cars to the equation will be a deadly oversight.
    - Knowing this, the Village will be a party to many lawsuits that result from the vehicular and vehicular/pedestrian and bicycle accidents that will result, and the costs in money to the Village and its insurers, as well as in injuries and life to those impacted, will far outweigh any benefit from quick fast-food.
- Noise Pollution: chronic noise, as outlined by the American Public Health Association, creates numerous health and cognitive issues that McDonald drive-thru operation would exacerbate.
  - All of us neighbors will be exposed to 19.5 hours a day and night of noise pollution from the 1,000+ cars, orders, deliveries, as well as possibly music, arguments, etc.
- Litter and Pests: McDonald's reliance on disposable packaging causes litter. It is estimated that every takeaway purchase from a McDonald's averages seven (7) items of potential litter per person. This will inevitably create a significant local litter problem, just tour the McDonalds and nearby area of any nearby McDonald's with a drive thru to see the problem. That same litter above will attract more rats, mice, and insects. The families nearby should not have to bear the burden of the disease, filth, and cost of controlling these pests for McDonald's.
- Residential Growth: adversely affect the future residential growth potential of the Village of Wilmette by forcing potential new (and existing) residents to relocate outside Wilmette to other areas on the North Shore more conducive to quiet and relatively pollution-free residential living.
- Property values decrease: studies have shown that the introduction of fast-food establishments in residential areas adversely affect property values: "Fast food and convenience store access are associated with lower housing values." Source: <a href="https://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/pmc/articles/PMC3765120/">https://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/pmc/articles/PMC3765120/</a>
- Crime: drive thrus are responsible for increase in crime; A 2016 study by the University of Texas at San Antonio found a positive association between the density of fast-food restaurants with drive-thrus and crime rates in San Antonio, Texas. The study specifically observed increased robbery, aggravated assault, and property crime rates with more drive-thrus. Source: The Association between Fast-Food Restaurants and Crime Rates in San Antonio, Texas" by Dr. Michael J. Smith and Dr. Eric P.

- Reputation: McDonald's drive thru would be a detriment to Wilmette's reputation, lifestyle as well as physical and economic safety.

Finally, attached please find a copy of an online petition signed by 403 residents.

Many of these points have substantial cost implications for the Village of Wilmette, and such increased economic burdens will greatly outweigh the perceived economic benefits that McDonald's Drive Thru would provide.

In light of these concerns, I respectfully request that the Board of Trustees:

- 1. Deny McDonald's request for the special use permits.
- 2. Alternatively, deny the drive-thru component of the application.
- 3. In the event that neither #1 nor #2, above, is granted, I hereby request compensation from the Village of Wilmette for the unlawful, arbitrary, discriminatory, and capricious deprivation and taking of my property (rights) without just compensation.

I want to thank you for your attention to this matter, as I urge you to deny the proposed McDonald's drive-thru.



I attended the zoning Board meeting on December 6th where members voted 4-3 to approve a zoning variance that would allow McDonald's to build a drive through restaurant at 200 Skokie Blvd.

I was shocked and disappointed that the members did not require McDonald's to adequately and honestly respond to the requirements outlined in the application for Special Use Section 30-5.3E Specifically:

b) The proposed business will not be detrimental to or endanger the public health, safety and welfare of residents

HEALTH: McDonalds stated that the average restaurant serves 1000 cars per day, with 70 to 80% using the drive through. They claimed that the average wait time from order to pick up is 3 ½ minutes. They **failed to disclose** the number of cars expected at THIS location, which they undoubtedly researched, and the fact that

during peak periods cars often idle for an additional 4 to 6 minutes waiting to get to the order widow.

Vehicle emissions are the number one source of air pollution in most areas. An idling vehicle releases serious levels of carbon monoxide, volatile organic compounds, nitrogen oxides and hydrocarbons into the air, and these greenhouse gasses impact not only the health of those living in close proximity to the emissions, but also the health of the planet. Moreover, in 2021 Wilmette adopted a Sustainability Plan that calls for the village to reduce GHG emissions 45% from 2010 levels by 2030 and reach net zero emissions by 2050. It commits to reducing village and resident practices that negatively impact air quality. *Allowing more than 800 cars a day to idle in a drive through is in direct conflict with Wilmette's stated commitment to sustainability.* 

SAFETY: McDonalds stated that they would adhere to any legally required safety regulations without actually addressing the obvious safety issues generated by 1000 additional cars per day turning from both the north and southbound lanes of Skokie Blvd. With a speed limit is 40 miles per hour on Skokie Blvd, if traffic backs up, is the village prepared for the resulting accidents that will require police and rescue resources? In addition, exiting vehicles will be turning right (north), blocking the entrance to Charles Place, and those who wish to go south are likely to pull into Charles Place to turn around, or go around the block and travel down Sunset Drive, a residential street that has no speed bumps, where children play and neighbors walk dogs. Will village insurance cover the expenses of a lawsuit when the first pedestrian is hit by a McDonald's customer?

The traffic study conducted by McDonalds and verified by village officials took place in 2022 on Veteran's Day, a national holiday, and on November 19<sup>th</sup>, the week before Thanksgiving. Neither day is typical, and when McDonalds stated in their application that the location would not impact existing traffic patterns, they admitted at the Zoning Board meeting that they did not account for the increased traffic already expected when Wayfair opens later this year.

### e) The proposed business will not negatively impact property values

McDonald's stated in their application that the drive through would have a positive influence on property values. They offered no measurable statistics, no research-based argument, absolutely nothing to substantiate this claim. My understanding is that the applicant has the burden of proof to show that property values would not be negatively impacted, and they did not meet that requirement under the special use application.

McDonalds also argued that a drive through restaurant was preferable to a vacant lot in terms of property values. I vehemently disagree. Residents WANT a neighborhood retail business in that space (we purchased our properties when Bakers Square was a thriving enterprise), but there is a vast difference between a sit-down restaurant where cars park and people dine in, and a drive through serving 1000 cars per day open from 5:30 a.m. until 10 p.m.

My neighbors and I have spoken with numerous realtors, who acknowledge that the noise, the smell of fried food and car exhaust, the litter and the increased traffic caused by a high volume fast food drive through will almost certainly drive home prices down in the surrounding streets and neighborhood. If we get appraisals on our homes now, and choose to sell once the drive though is operational, will the Village cover the difference between our appraised value and the price we are forced to sell at? You will have voted yes based on the assurance that property values would not go down, leaving you, and not McDonald's open to potential litigation.

h) The proposed business will be consistent with the community character of the neighborhood.

I chose to live in **Wilmette** because it **is a charming, quiet, upscale north shore suburb, which is completely at odds with a high volume fast-food drive through.** The village has recently been very vocal in its opposition to the rezoning of Ryan Field, stating that concerts would be a "gross infringement upon the quiet enjoyment of Wilmette residents' property and will forever change the character of the residential neighborhood." The same can be said for the building of a McDonald's drive though.

I want to be able to sit in my backyard, open my widows in the spring and summer, and maintain a sense of privacy without being forced to deal with the noise, the headlights, the pollution and the rodents that will result from a fast-food drive through. I do NOT want west Wilmette to become an extension of Skokie, which is what it will feel like if McDonalds is allowed to build.

If the Board approves this application, it will be setting a precedent that will allow every other fast-food chain to open a drive through in Wilmette. Once you say yes to one, you cannot refuse the rest. Your legacy will be that you forever changed the character of Wilmette.

Please carefully consider the consequences of allowing a high-volume fast-food drive through in our village and vote NO on McDonald's application.

Dear President Plunkett,

I am writing to you as a concerned citizen of Wilmette who is strongly opposed to the Village granting McDonald's the two (2) special use exceptions they are seeking to build and operate a 4,000 square foot McDonald's with a dual-lane ordering drive-thru in our neighborhood on a lot zoned "Neighborhood Retail" that would operate 19.5 hours a day where such a business could not otherwise operate. This proposal is much better suited to an I-55 exit than a lot surrounded by residential areas on three sides. While there may be some limited economic benefits, the long-term negative consequences on the health, safety, environment, living conditions, property values, and character and culture of our neighborhood and Village far outweigh the almost non-existent economic development a large McDonald's drive-thru in a residential neighborhood of our Village would represent.

I know that others have provided the Board with ample evidence of the negative impact approving both special use exceptions McDonald's is seeking would have on the health, safety, environment, living conditions, property values and use, and character of our neighborhood and Village, and so I'd like to focus on an often overlooked point--what a terrible precedent approving them both would set for Wilmette. If the Village votes to approve both special use exceptions and allow this McDonald's with dual drive-thru ordering, you are essentially voting to make Wilmette the fast-food drive-thru capital of the North Shore. If a 4,000 square foot McDonald's with dual ordering drive-thru does not present enough negative health, safety, environment, living conditions, property value, and zoning plan issues on a lot zoned Neighborhood Retail, for the Village to deny one or both special use exceptions, those being the most widely used legal reasons such applications for special use can be denied, a 3,000 sq. ft.

Arby's, Taco Bell, White Castle, etc. with a single lane ordering drive thru certainly will not, and any attempt by Wilmette to deny them such special use exceptions on any other Neighborhood Retail lot (much less a lot zoned "Commercial," where this McDonald's should be if it were going to be anywhere in Wilmette) will result in a lawsuit by the applicant where Wilmette will have no real legal legs to stand on—if I were they lawyer, I'd certainly advise them to sue if denied based on the McDonald's precedent. By seeking two (2) special use exceptions on a parcel zoned Neighborhood Retail, McDonald's is asking the Village to fundamentally change Wilmette's zoning plan. Such a drastic change will certainly result in legal challenges from the neighborhood should both be approved. Turning Wilmette into Skokie or Morton Grove is the exact opposite of progress—just look at the many communities that have and many more that are considering, limiting, or banning drive-thrus across the country, in red states and blue states. I cannot imagine you would want to support such a regressive proposal and fundamentally change the character of our Village.

On a more personal note, my wife, child (Hanna, now 10 months old), and I recently relocated from the city and were thrilled to be moving to Wilmette. We bought a townhome that is adjacent to the lot at 200 Skokie. While we knew it was zoned "Neighborhood Retail," and could be the home to a Caddyshack's, we never in a million years imagined that Wilmette would radically overhaul its approach to zoning and instead consider approving two special use exceptions that would allow a first of its kind in Wilmette 4,000 square foot, dual ordering drive-thru fast-food business that would operate 19.5 hours a day in a residential area. We are faced with the possibility of the attendant air pollution, litter, noise pollution, light pollution, safety hazards, traffic, and negative property value impact of a McDonald's with dual drive-thru ordering—we'll get to experience all 800+ drive-thru orders, music, arguments, discussions, deliveries and so on for the 1000+ cars a day, all from our backyard and second and third story windows and bedrooms. It will essentially render our backyard unusable, and allow our daughter and us to sleep for 4.5 hours a night undisturbed by the light and noise pollution from those cars, orders, people, music, deliveries, and so on. It is shocking to us that the Village would even consider the two special use exceptions required to put this on a Neighborhood Retail lot adjacent to residential properties, depriving residents of rights guaranteed to them under Illinois law, versus a lot zoned Commercial, where one could at least perhaps foresee this being considered. I am not opposed to McDonald's, there is one in the pedway area of my office building downtown that I use at least once a month. However, the lot at 200 Skokie is not an interstate exit or even simply a lot zoned Commercial, and this proposal by McDonald's is entirely inappropriate for the location and zoning.

For the above reasons alone, I would urge you to vote to reject both of McDonald's requested special use exceptions. When combined with the plentiful evidence provided to the Board by others on the real and significant negative impacts the proposed facility and absurd hours would have on the environment, safety, traffic, parking, health, property values and use, and the general character of the neighborhood and Village, I very strongly urge you to vote against these proposed special use exceptions and not change Wilmette's zoning plan.

However, in the spirit of compromise and settlement, rather than being the Village Board remembered for starting the process of turning Wilmette into Morton Grove, I think many neighbors would accept following Winnetka's lead instead. Winnetka approved a McDonald's with a very understated and appropriate design, but without a drive-thru. Approve the limited-service special use exception on this Neighborhood Retail lot with reasonable hours, but not the dual-lane ordering drive-thru special use exception. Eliminating the dual lane ordering drive-thru: (i) results in the remediation of a lot of the health, safety, environment, living condition, property value and use, and zoning plan issues with the proposed exceptions; (ii) doesn't set a terrible precedent allowing the proliferation of fast-food drive-thrus throughout the Village; (iii) will result in much less community opposition; (iv) show that the Village is business friendly and willing to work with businesses that want to make good and appropriate investments in our Village by giving McDonald's the reasonable half of the zoning changes they are

seeking; and (v) would be much more likely to survive any legal challenge by those in the neighborhood, though I can also say that one is not likely if there is no drive-thru.

My name is Cedric Young; my wife Mary and I recently moved to Wilmette from Evanston, and it was brought to our attention of the proposed McDonalds occupying the former Bakers Square on Skokie blvd near our Charles Place townhouse. We're concerned with the impact of changing the zoning change that will allow this transition. As a former resident of Evanston I can tell you the impact on this residential community will be significant. To start the traffic flow on Skokie blvd; a posted limit of 40 mph will create serious problems with drivers and potential customers using the drive through. Anyone using Skokie between golf and the junction for 94 north know the speed limits routinely exceed ten or more miles a hour over the forty limit. This will create serious hazards when drive through customers create backups onto the boulevard as cars jam the right lane on the north bound side during morning rush periods. The logistics of these backups will affect safety of residents as they walk with children, jog, and ride bicycles. In addition the noise levels will become significantly raised by orders taken over speakers as well as the music blaring from car radios from people who could care less about the tranquility of the neighborhood. I speak from the experience of the years spent trying to navigate Dempster west of Dodge when two lanes frequently turned to one as cars from the drive through backed up to the street. The addition of a second

window only created a second jam up as customers coming south on Dodge clashed with those west bound on Dempster. When I moved to Charles Place in August my mover remarked as they competed the move: "you hear that"? We all knew he was referring to the lovely sound of silence. We join with everyone opposing the zoning change that will inevitably replace that silence with constant distractions for a proposed twenty hour operating day; seven days a week.

I wanted to make another appeal to you as the next hearing date on 200 Skokie Blvd approaches. This issue has allowed me to better educate myself on a number of topics. The conversation surrounding this potential unwanted neighborhood addition is raging throughout multiple online groups, emails, articles, etc. There are 500 signatures between 2 petitions. Every single public comment on those petitions should be read and considered by each one of you ahead of this decision. The traffic, the accidents, the environmental damage, the noise, the pollution, the property value loss, the erosion of the character of this village are ALL on the table. These same valid points were made in 1985 in East Wilmette, and the board agreed. I am urging you to act on behalf of the residents that will be most affected with the same unanimous vote that the board took against the NU stadium expansion. The 'profiteering' as you put it is the same for both issues. McDonalds has the most valuable real estate portfolio in the world - \$40B. All I keep hearing is that this comes down to dollars and cents, but I am curious about how this supposed influx would trickle down to Wilmette. Is selling out to this corporation worth the community damage in the long run? Despite all of this sentiment, this really comes down to being consistent with the ordinances and variances already in place. Making this special use exemption for a drive thru fast food restaurant will be a trojan horse for additional drive-thru's in this community. No 'neighborhood retail' designated area is safe and you will have invalidated its intent.

Finally, I have major concerns with the traffic study presented at the previous meeting. Upon review of the traffic study by a Transportation Demand Consultant who reviews traffic studies as part of her duties her notes are below (she will submit a statement if needed):

- -There is absolutely no way they can say that a new fast food restaurant will have no impact on the adjacent roadway, therefore exempting them from having to make any improvements...No way.
- -The way they're doing the traffic impact analysis is a bit old school too the new way of thinking is NOT to use "level of service " to evaluate an intersection because it inherently allows for delays (how long you'll have to wait in the number of seconds) and then forces intersection widening to reduce the delay.
- -the traffic counts are a year old, too...not sure if things have changed in the past year, as we get further out of the pandemic.
- -they can't expect people to digest traffic counts in a table format.
- -another problem with traffic studies- they can't take into account all of the other developments happening (Chabad, Funeral home) then the city gets stuck with a corridor that needs improvements.
- -Demand that the city require all those developers to collectively fund a corridor study by a third party traffic engineer.
- an inherent problem with those traffic impact studies- as the traffic engineer, your client is the McDonald's and even though they don't tell you to skew it so they don't have to do any improvements, you know that's what they want.

I hope you had a very nice holiday. I had written a previous email opposing the McDonald's on 200 Skokie Blvd. but also would like to provide additional environmental data that we have gathered for your review prior to approving a McDonald's drive-through on behalf of myself and the concerned Wilmette residents. As of today, a growing number of Wilmette residents, over 600 which includes the petitions prior to the ZBA, have signed on-line and paper petitions opposing the McDonald's drive-through. Below is the additional information that pose a health risk to Wilmette residents if approved:

Environmental Impacts of Drive-Throughs (Noise, Light and Air Pollution/Odor):

#### 1. Noise Pollution:

According to the American Public Health Association <a href="https://www.apha.org/Policies-and-">https://www.apha.org/Policies-and-</a> Advocacy/Public-Health-Policy-Statements/Policy-Database/2022/01/07/Noise-as-a-Public-Health- Hazard: Chronic noise, even at low levels, can cause annoyance, sleep disruption, and stress that contribute to cardiovascular disease, cerebrovascular disease, metabolic disturbances, exacerbation of psychological disorders, and premature mortality. Noise interferes with cognition and learning, contributes to behavior problems, and reduces achievement and productivity.

How will the Village of Wilmette address the health risk to the immediately adjacent residents of the proposed McDonalds from the constant noise for 16.5 hours per day? Who will monitor

#### 2. Light Pollution:

According to the following website (<a href="https://www.webmd.com/a-to-z-guides/what-">https://www.webmd.com/a-to-z-guides/what-</a> is-light-pollution):

• You need darkness to live a healthy life. Before the invention of artificial light, humans were adjusted to a natural 12 hours of daylight and 12 hours of darkness.

- This cycle is part of your circadian rhythm, your body's internal "clock" that helps you fall asleep at night and wake up in the morning. Manmade light at night disrupts it.
- Circadian rhythm disruptions may lead to problems like:
- Sleep disorders, such as insomnia and delayed sleep-phase syndrome
- Depression
- High blood pressure
- ADHD
- Obesity
- Diabetes
- Heart disease With the proposed hours of operation, especially in the winter months, the lights from the proposed McDonalds will cause a risk to the health and well- being of the adjacent residents.

How will the Village of Wilmette address the health risk from light pollution to the adjacent residents of the proposed McDonalds?

#### 3. Air Pollution:

The combustion of fuel in an internal combustion engine in cars and trucks results in exhaust gases that are comprised of the following:

- Carbon dioxide (CO2) CO2 is a greenhouse gas, and a major contributing factor to climate change.
- Carbon monoxide (CO) –is the result of incomplete combustion of fuel and is toxic.
- Nitrogen oxides (NOx) Nitrogen oxides are produced during combustion processes. They are highly reactive and contribute to the formation of ozone when they come into contact with other airborne chemicals.
- Hydrocarbons (HC) HCs result from incomplete combustion in internal combustion engines. Benzene (C6H6) is one of the HC in vehicle exhaust. It is emitted in very small quantities but is carcinogenic. The USEPA has classified benzene a Group A, known human carcinogen.

According to the American Cancer Society: Exposure to benzene has been linked with a higher risk of cancer, particularly leukemia and other cancers of blood cells.

According to the "World Health Organization Guidelines for Indoor Air Quality: Selected Pollutants", benzene is a genotoxic carcinogen in humans and **no safe level of exposure can be recommended.** 

Due to the very small distance from the proposed drive-through lanes to the adjacent homes and the 16.5 hours of operation per day year-round of the McDonalds, it is possible that the long-term impacts to the residents could include cancer.

#### Odor:

In addition to air pollutant emissions from vehicle exhaust, a 2019 study from Carnegie Mellon indicated that restaurants are:

...responsible for high concentrations of organic aerosol, a large source of air pollution, within their immediately surrounding areas.

Restaurants cook with large amounts of oils and other organic matter, which is aerosolized and ventilated from the kitchen in the form of exhaust. This exhaust carries the organic aerosol produced in the cooking process into the urban environment.

The National Academy of Sciences estimates that organic aerosols contribute to approximately 4.2 million premature deaths per year.

• According to the USEPA: Persistent odors from air pollution sources can be a nuisance and also may cause health concerns for impacted communities. Many compounds can cause odors including volatile organic compounds (VOCs), hazardous air pollutants (HAPs), and sulfur compounds (for example mercaptans and hydrogen sulfide). Even if odorous compounds are not considered hazardous to human health, they can impact well-being for community members, causing stress, confusion, and concern about exposures.

How will the Village of Wilmette address the health risk to the immediately adjacent residents of the proposed McDonald's?

#### -Cars estimated per year and also comparison to Ryan Field:

Based on the conservative estimate of 1,000 cars per day, 800 going through the drive-through in this Neighborhood Retail lot, which is adjacent to residential homes (10 feet away), would encounter 46% more cars on an annual basis than Ryan Field. Eight hundred cars going through this lot daily would represent 194,180 lbs. of Co2. estimated 46% more than Ryan Field. We can choose a better restaurant option for this lot rather than a fast food drive-through.

I would like to strongly voice my concern and objection to a McDonald's drive-through at 200 Skokie Blvd. There are many reasons why this is a significant problem.

First, there is a synagogue across the street that holds services and major events regularly and to which attendees walk. There is also a school for the synagogue and events which attract large numbers of children. These attendees will be put at regular risk from up to 1,000 cars coming to the McDonald's site on a daily basis.

Second, there are 2 funeral homes in the vicinity, but in particular one directly kitty-corner. This funeral home regularly hosts very large funerals and there are numerous cars that line up for the procession, blocking traffic regularly. It will be very problematic to have the drive through also managing cars on the very same street corner as the funeral procession.

Third, the intersection is also on a hill, and visibility, as well as judgement of the speed, of oncoming traffic approaching from the North is often inhibited. I have lived on Old Glenview road and used this intersection for 35 years, and I know how problematic that intersection can be. - Traffic count dates / days of the week are inconsistent: The Traffic Impact Study dated 10/27/2023 cites that the traffic counts were conducted on Wednesday, November 11, 2022. November 11, 2022 was actually a Friday. Fridays are not representative of "normal" traffic because it is common for people to take Fridays off of school and work for travel or remote work days. If the date is correct and the counts were conducted on a Friday, the existing conditions traffic counts would likely be lower than if the counts were conducted on a Tuesday-Thursday. That particular date, November 11, was also Veterans Day holiday, so presumably traffic volumes would have been even lighter on that Friday. It's likely that the traffic counts were actually conducted on Wednesday of that week (11/9/2022), and just the date is incorrect. I think I would still avoid holiday weeks to conduct traffic counts, though. (It should be acknowledged that they DID look back at 2018 traffic counts, presumably to compare to pre-pandemic volumes, and found that the existing traffic volumes, even at this presumably lower rate, are still higher than 2018. That said, if the existing volumes are not low / not accurate, all other turning counts at the two driveways would be lower, making it difficult to determine the exact improvements or designs that should be made.
- Study accounts for a 50% pass-by reduction in the trip generation, ignoring the full impact at the two access points along Skokie: The traffic impact study states that the ITE trip generation manual finds that 50% of trips generated by fast-food restaurants with a drive-through come from pass-by trips meaning that only half of the trips going in/out of the fast food restaurant are from new traffic on the roadway. That may be the case, but the site plan

shows ONLY the 50% of trips at the two driveways/access points on Skokie, NOT the FULL 100% of trips that WOULD still be turning in and out of those two driveways. In other words, they project TWICE as many cars will be turning into and out of the two driveways than what are shown on the site plan. Even if those trips come from existing traffic volumes, they still should be shown (and therefore deducted from the through volumes) as turning into the site. As such, it seems impossible to know the impact or delays that might be caused by the northbound right turns into the southern driveway – they could easily queue back into the intersection of Skokie/Old Glenview, since it is only 100' from the intersection.

Note: I didn't check ALL of their numbers – I only checked the morning peak "in" and mid-day peak "in" numbers on the site plan (figure 6, southbound left turns and two northbound right turns) against the total number of "in" trips and the 50% Pass-By Trips in their table of "Peak Hour Site-Generated Traffic Volumes" (table 3). But the numbers match exactly with the 50% Pass-By Trips numbers, so presumably they used that consistently for all peak hours of the day.

#### Access management suggestions:

- Personally, I would recommend moving any/all access points as far away from signalized intersections as possible. I'm not sure whether they need two access points for emergency vehicles, but if they don't need two access points, then I would eliminate the southern access entirely, as it's only 100' from the signalized intersection (as noted above).
- I also wouldn't allow for any left-turns into or out of the site. It just
  provides for more opportunity for delays, and the queu of motorists
  waiting to make southbound left turns into McDonalds may prevent
  other southbound motorists from realizing that queu is not the same as
  the southbound left turn lane at the Skokie/Old Glenview intersection,
  etc.
- Finally, I would always recommend, where possible, that driveways and streets be located directly across from each other, rather than staggered as shown on the site plan. Doing this would require a full redesign of the site, so they may be unwilling. But having off-set intersections causes a great deal of confusion and hesitation for motorists and therefore additional delay. It's hard to explain in writing, but basically a person thinks they can pull out but then someone from the other access across the street pulls out first, causing confusion.
- Overall, I'd recommend one driveway for the site, and have it be located directly across from EITHER the retail access drive OR the residential access drive - ideally, the residential access drive, since it's further from the signalized intersection of Skokie and Old Glenview.

- I calculated a few emissions for an entire year.
- I assumed that there would be 14 cars in the drive-through at all hours of the day. That might be high for some of the hours of the day, but I had no way of guessing how that would fluctuate by the hour.
- And I have no way of estimating how many might be EVs.
- Oh, also I know this fact sheet is old (2008) but I couldn't find anything newer. I know the vehicle fleet has gotten cleaner over the years, but this is as best as I could find. I'll ask a few people tomorrow at work if they have seen anything newer in various modeling tools and circle back if I have updates.
- But, to offset, I assumed conservatively on the vehicle type I just assumed all
  cars would be light-duty passenger vehicles (no trucks or SUVs, etc.).

These are all just estimates however:

This drive-through will emit more than 15,000 pounds of Carbon Monoxide, nearly 800 pounds of Nitrix Oxide, almost 700 pounds of hydrocarbons, and 600 pounds of volatile organic compounds EVERY YEAR.

I wanted to make another appeal to you as the next hearing date on 200 Skokie Blvd approaches. This issue has allowed me to better educate myself on a number of topics. The conversation surrounding this potential unwanted neighborhood addition is raging throughout multiple online groups, emails, articles, etc. There are 500 signatures between 2 petitions. Every single public comment on those petitions should be read and considered by each one of you ahead of this decision. The traffic, the accidents, the environmental damage, the

noise, the pollution, the property value loss, the erosion of the character of this village are ALL on the table. These same valid points were made in 1985 in East Wilmette, and the board agreed. I am urging you to act on behalf of the residents that will be most affected with the same unanimous vote that the board took against the NU stadium expansion. The 'profiteering' as you put it is the same for both issues. McDonalds has the most valuable real estate portfolio in the world -\$40B. All I keep hearing is that this comes down to dollars and cents, but I am curious about how this supposed influx would trickle down to Wilmette. Is selling out to this corporation worth the community damage in the long run? Despite all of this sentiment, this really comes down to being consistent with the ordinances and variances already in place. Making this special use exemption for a drive thru fast food restaurant will be a trojan horse for additional drive-thru's in this community. No 'neighborhood retail' designated area is safe and you will have invalidated its intent.

Finally, I have major concerns with the traffic study presented at the previous meeting. Upon review of the traffic study by a Transportation Demand Consultant who reviews traffic studies as part of her duties her notes are below (she will submit a statement if needed):

- -There is absolutely no way they can say that a new fast food restaurant will have no impact on the adjacent roadway, therefore exempting them from having to make any improvements...No way.
- -The way they're doing the traffic impact analysis is a bit old school too the new way of thinking is NOT to use "level of service " to evaluate an intersection because it inherently allows for delays (how long you'll have to wait in the number of seconds) and then forces intersection widening to reduce the delay.
- -the traffic counts are a year old, too...not sure if things have changed in the past year, as we get further out of the pandemic.
- -they can't expect people to digest traffic counts in a table format.
- -another problem with traffic studies- they can't take into account all of the other developments happening (Chabad, Funeral home) then the city gets stuck with a corridor that needs improvements.
- -Demand that the city require all those developers to collectively fund a corridor study by a third party traffic engineer.
- an inherent problem with those traffic impact studies- as the traffic engineer, your client is the McDonald's and even though they don't tell you to skew it so they don't have to do any improvements, you know that's what they want.
- -they should possibly make other improvements at the access points, or be required to put in a dedicated right turn lane into the lot, etc.

Subject: McDonald's Traffic Impact Study


- Traffic count dates / days of the week are inconsistent: The Traffic Impact Study dated 10/27/2023 cites that the traffic counts were conducted on Wednesday, November 11, 2022. November 11, 2022 was actually a Friday. Fridays are not representative of "normal" traffic because it is common for people to take Fridays off of school and work for travel or remote work days. If the date is correct and the counts were conducted on a Friday, the existing conditions traffic counts would likely be lower than if the counts were conducted on a Tuesday-Thursday. That particular date, November 11, was also Veterans Day holiday, so presumably traffic volumes would have been even lighter on that Friday. It's likely that the traffic counts were actually conducted on Wednesday of that week (11/9/2022), and just the date is incorrect. I think I would still avoid holiday weeks to conduct traffic counts, though. (It should be acknowledged that they DID look back at 2018 traffic counts, presumably to compare to pre-pandemic volumes, and found that the existing traffic volumes, even at this presumably lower rate, are still higher than 2018. That said, if the existing volumes are not low / not accurate, all other turning counts at the two driveways would be lower, making it difficult to determine the exact improvements or designs that should be made.
- Study accounts for a 50% pass-by reduction in the trip generation, ignoring the full impact at the two access points along Skokie: The traffic impact study states that the ITE trip generation manual finds that 50% of trips generated by fast-food restaurants with a drive-through come from pass-by trips meaning that only half of the trips going in/out of the fast food restaurant are from new traffic on the roadway. That may be the case, but the site plan

shows ONLY the 50% of trips at the two driveways/access points on Skokie, NOT the FULL 100% of trips that WOULD still be turning in and out of those two driveways. In other words, they project TWICE as many cars will be turning into and out of the two driveways than what are shown on the site plan. Even if those trips come from existing traffic volumes, they still should be shown (and therefore deducted from the through volumes) as turning into the site. As such, it seems impossible to know the impact or delays that might be caused by the northbound right turns into the southern driveway – they could easily queue back into the intersection of Skokie/Old Glenview, since it is only 100' from the intersection.

Note: I didn't check ALL of their numbers – I only checked the morning peak "in" and mid-day peak "in" numbers on the site plan (figure 6, southbound left turns and two northbound right turns) against the total number of "in" trips and the 50% Pass-By Trips in their table of "Peak Hour Site-Generated Traffic Volumes" (table 3). But the numbers match exactly with the 50% Pass-By Trips numbers, so presumably they used that consistently for all peak hours of the day.

#### Access management suggestions:

- Personally, I would recommend moving any/all access points as far away from signalized intersections as possible. I'm not sure whether they need two access points for emergency vehicles, but if they don't need two access points, then I would eliminate the southern access entirely, as it's only 100' from the signalized intersection (as noted above).
- I also wouldn't allow for any left-turns into or out of the site. It just provides for more opportunity for delays, and the queu of motorists waiting to make southbound left turns into McDonalds may prevent other southbound motorists from realizing that queu is not the same as the southbound left turn lane at the Skokie/Old Glenview intersection, etc.
- Finally, I would always recommend, where possible, that driveways and streets be located directly across from each other, rather than staggered as shown on the site plan. Doing this would require a full redesign of the site, so they may be unwilling. But having off-set intersections causes a great deal of confusion and hesitation for motorists and therefore additional delay. It's hard to explain in writing, but basically a person thinks they can pull out but then someone from the other access across the street pulls out first, causing confusion.
- Overall, I'd recommend one driveway for the site, and have it be located directly across from EITHER the retail access drive OR the residential access drive - ideally, the residential access drive, since it's further from the signalized intersection of Skokie and Old Glenview.

# Idling Vehicle Emissions for Passenger Cars, Light-Duty Trucks, and Heavy-Duty Trucks

The amount of pollution that a vehicle emits is dependent on many factors. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has developed a series of computer models that estimate the average emissions for different types of highway vehicles. This fact sheet is one of a series on highway vehicle emission factors. It presents average emission rates for passenger cars, light-duty trucks, (e.g., pickup trucks, sport-utility vehicles), heavy-duty trucks (semi tractor-trailers), and motorcycles when they are idling.

### Introduction

There are a number of factors that affect the rate at which any vehicle emits air pollutants, whether the vehicle is being driven or is at idle (engine running, but vehicle not moving). Some of the most important are:

- vehicle type/size (passenger cars, light-duty trucks, heavy-duty trucks, motor-cycles)
- vehicle age and accumulated mileage
- fuel used (gasoline, diesel, others)
- ambient weather conditions (temperature, precipitation, wind)
- maintenance condition of the vehicle (well maintained, in need of maintenance, presence and condition of pollution control equipment)

The most current version of the computer model that EPA uses to estimate average in-use emissions from highway vehicles is MOBILE6.2. EPA, the States, and others use this model to estimate total emissions of pollutants generated by highway vehicles in various geographic areas and over specific time periods. The idle emission rates or "emission factors" presented in this fact sheet are based on national data representing the in-use fleet as of July 2008.



The emission rates of hydrocarbons (both volatile organic compounds [VOCs] and Total Hydrocarbons [THC]), carbon monoxide (CO), and nitrogen oxides (NOx) for idling vehicles are presented in the following tables. In addition, the emission rates of particulate matter (PM<sub>10</sub> and PM, 5) are provided for heavyduty diesel vehicles only because the MOBILE model does not include PM for the other vehicle categories during idle operation.1 These emission factors assume an "average" properly maintained vehicle, operating on typical gasoline or diesel fuel, on a warm summer day. Emission rates can be higher in very hot weather (especially HC) or in very cold weather (especially CO).

National average values are used for registration distributions by age (what fraction of all cars, or light trucks, in use today are of the current model year, are one to two years old, 2 to 3 years old, and so forth up to 25 years old) and annual mileage accumulation rates by age (newer vehicles tend to be driven more miles

Note that these emission rates are applicable for relatively short periods of idle time, as observed in drive-thru lanes, at toll gates, at stop lights, and in very heavily congested traffic. These idle emission rates are not applicable to "hoteling" situations for heavy-duty diesel trucks, where the truck engine may be idling for periods of hours at a time with many accessories being operated from the engine power. EPA is currently studying the issue of emissions from heavy-duty

diesel trucks during "hoteling" situations; more information on this subject is available on EPA's SmartWay Transport Partnership Program web site at: www.epa.gov/smartway/idling.htm.

These emission rates also are not applicable for buses (urban transit buses and school buses). Average idle emission estimates for urban and school buses are provided in the fact sheet "Average In-Use Emission Factors for Urban Buses and School Buses" (EPA420-F-08-026).

#### **Idle Emission Rates**

The following tables present idle emission factors expressed as grams per hour (g/hr) and grams per minute (g/min) of idle time. Table 1 presents idling emission rates for gasoline-fueled and diesel cars, light-duty trucks, and heavy-duty vehicles, and motorcycles.

#### **Definitions of Vehicle Types**

(Gross Vehicle Weight)

LDGV: Light-duty gasoline-fueled vehicles, up to 6000 lb GVW (gasoline-fueled passenger cars)

LDGT: Light-duty gasoline-fueled trucks, up to 8500 lb GVW (includes pick-up trucks, minivans, passenger vans, sport-utility vehicles, etc.)

HDGV: Heavy-duty gasoline-fueled vehicles, over 8500 lb GVW (gasoline-fueled heavy-duty trucks)

LDDV: Light-duty diesel vehicles, up to 6000 lb GVW (diesel engine passenger cars)

LDDT: Light-duty diesel trucks, up to 8500 lb GVW (diesel engine light-duty trucks)

HDDV: Heavy-duty diesel vehicles, over 8500 lb GVW (diesel engine heavy-duty trucks)

MC: Motorcycles (only those certified for highway use; all are gasoline-fueled)

The HDDV column represents the average of all diesel engine vehicles over 8,500 lb gross vehicle weight (GVW); this category is dominated by the heaviest HDDVs (GVW Classes VIIIa and VIIIb) which exceed 33,000 lb GVW.

#### **Endnotes**

1. The MOBILE model includes PM estimates for heavy-duty diesel vehicles only during idle operation because there has been insufficient emission testing of PM for gasoline-fueled vehicles of the type necessary to develop emission rates for these vehicles at idle, since the PM contribution to ambient air quality from gasoline vehicles and the few light duty diesel cars and trucks in the fleet is normally negligible.

- 2. Figures presented in this fact sheet are averages only. Individual vehicles can differ substantially in the amount of pollution emitted while idling from the values indicated here. Emission rates may differ slightly from original sources due to rounding.
- 3. All of the emission estimates provided in this document are consistent, in terms of assumptions made and modeling methodology, with those provided in the other fact sheets in this series: "Average Annual Emissions and Fuel Consumption for Gasoline-Fueled Passenger Cars and Light Trucks" (EPA420-F-08-024), "Average In-Use Emissions from Heavy-Duty Trucks" (EPA420-F-08-027), and "Average In-Use Emission Factors for Urban Buses and School Buses" (EPA420-F-08-026).
