#### PURCHASE 2010 VEHICLE STICKERS

Vehicle stickers will be available for purchase as of March 1st and must be displayed by April 15th. Residents who currently have a Village vehicle sticker will be mailed an application, and upon receipt of a completed application along with proper payment, will receive a vehicle sticker by mail.

Stickers may also be purchased in person at the Village Hall Finance counter during regular business hours and from 9:00 am to 12:00 pm on the following Saturdays: March 6, 13, 20, 27 and April 3 and 10.

The fee for passenger vehicles is \$80 and the fee for trucks is \$95. Vehicles not displaying a 2010 vehicle sticker after April 15th risk receiving a citation from the Police Department. A portion of the revenue generated from the sale of vehicle stickers is used to maintain the Village's infrastructure, including streets, alleys and curbs.

#### 2010 CENSUS- GET COUNTED!

The U.S. Constitution requires a national census once every 10 years. The census population totals determine which states gain or lose representation in Congress and determines the amount of state and federal funding communities receive over the course of a decade. The 2010 Census data will directly impact how more than \$4 trillion is allocated to local and state governments. To ensure that Wilmette gets its fair share of funding, it is critical that all of our residents complete the Census questionnaire.

The 2010 Census questionnaire asks only a few simple questions of each person – name, relationship, gender, age, ethnicity, and whether you own or rent your home. This simple, short questionnaire takes just a few minutes to complete and return by mail. The Census Bureau does not release or share information identifying individual respondents or their household for 72 years.

# NEW SOLID WASTE PROGRAM STARTS IN LATE MARCH

Please be sure to review the enclosed insert regarding the Village's new refuse, recycling and yard waste program. The new collection program will begin on March 29th and will include the following changes:

- ★ Curbside refuse, recycling and yard waste pick-up for those customers that currently receive back door service
- ★ A wheeled refuse toter provided to all customers at no cost
- ★ A wheeled recycling toter provided to all customers at no cost

Most residents will see a change in their collection day. On your new collection day, refuse and recycling will be collected on the same day. Yard waste will only be collected on Wednesdays.

#### NEW REFUSE, RECYCLING AND YARD WASTE PROGRAM

As you will read in this issue of The Communicator, the Village's new refuse, recycling and yard waste program will begin in late March. The new collection program will be automated, meaning that Veolia's drivers do not need to exit their trucks to collect waste, thereby reducing the financial impact of solid waste collection to the Village and residents alike.

Beginning March 22nd, more than 17,000 toters will be delivered throughout the community by Veolia. Given the number of toters to be delivered in such a short period of time, it is reasonable to expect some mistakes in terms of toters not delivered or the wrong sized toters delivered. ## Letter from Village President Christopher S. Canning

#### VILLAGE CENTER MASTER PLAN

The Village expects to complete two major development related initiatives in 2010:

- · Village Center Master Plan
- Zoning Ordinance Rewrite

The Village Center Master Plan will set forth a strategy to revitalize the Village Center so that it continues to develop as a vibrant hub for retail, dining, and entertainment options. When completed, the plan will provide recommendations for allowable building height, building and streetscape design, pedestrian, transit and vehicular improvements, and economic development incentives.

Aresident advisory committee is providing oversight of the planning process, while The Lakota Group, a professional planning firm, has been hired to assist in drafting the plan. A majority of the funding for the planning process is provided by a \$100,000 Regional Transportation Authority Community Planning Grant.

The Lakota Group is currently conducting background research and analysis of the study area. Once that task is complete, community meetings will be held to present ideas and obtain the preferences of area residents, businesses, employees and property owners. Since the success of this plan depends in large part on the participation of our residents and businesses, I encourage you to sign-up for the Master Plan e-mail list by visiting the Village's website.

#### ZONING ORDINANCE REWRITE

At the same time we are working on the Master Plan, we will also be updating the Village's Zoning Ordinance which was last updated more than 20 years ago. To

ensure that the zoning process is efficient and easy to navigate for residents and businesses alike, the Village has hired the urban planning firm Camiros to assist with the revision of the ordinance. As with the Village Center Master Plan, your opinions in this process are important and I encourage your participation.

#### 2011 BUDGET

Although it is only February, the Village has already started looking forward to the 2011 Budget. As you will read in this issue, the 2010 Budget included reduced expenses of \$1.4 million and includes the lowest property tax increase since 1999; with the Village's tax levy accounting for only 11% of your total property tax bill. The Village Board is committed to providing the services you expect and deserve and will be working diligently throughout the year to monitor revenues and expenditures to ensure that the Village maintains its solid financial position as we approach 2011.

In 2010, the Village's pension costs increased by \$525,000 and one of the challenges we will face in preparing the 2011 Budget will be the continued costs of public employee pensions. Let me be clear: our public safety employees put their lives on the line for us each day and they earn the pension benefits for which they are entitled. You may not realize that public safety employees are not eligible to receive Social Security benefits from their employment with the Village (and in some cases Medicare). As such, pensions are a critical component of their retirement security. The failure of the General Assembly to create a sustainable pension system puts the retirement benefits of our public safety employees at stake-- this is not acceptable and must be changed.

As I wrote in the last issue of *The Communicator*, the Village has little control of these rapidly increasing pension expenses since the type of

#### PEST MANAGEMENT TIPS

As Spring approaches, pests and rodents will be seeking food and water sources. Sanitation is the key to eliminating and controlling pests. Eliminating the food and water supply is imperative to eliminating these pests. Plese keep these tips in mind to avoid pest problems:

- Avoid feeding/watering pets outdoors
- Store dry pet food and bird seed in rodent-proof containers
- Lease additional garbage toters from Veolia if overflowing garbage is an issue
- Replace damaged garbage toters (As of March 29th, contact Veolia for replacement toters at 847-272-4145)
- Limit feeding of birds and other wildlifeespecially any form of ground feeding

pension benefit is mandated by the General Assembly. Despite the contributions of our employees to assist in funding these pensions (public safety employees contribute nearly 10% of their annual salary), the General Assembly has failed to provide municipalities with a means to address these escalating costs other than cutting services or increasing taxes. Until the members of the General Assembly in Springfield hear from you and other taxpayers that you want the General Assembly to reform the pension system, the Village can continue to expect significant cost increases associated with public pensions.

The Village's 2011 Budget projections include \$565,000 in additional pension expenses. I again encourage you to contact your legislators in Springfield and tell them that the current pension system must be reformed in order to provide sustainable retirement benefits for our public safety employees and to ensure that the Village of Wilmette can afford to provide all of the services you expect and deserve as taxpayers.

As always, the Village Board and I welcome your input. Feel free to contact any members of the Village staff or Village Board with your comments or questions.

#### 2010 ADOPTED BUDGET


While facing significant declines in revenue, the Village continues to meet its goal of maintaining the high level of service residents in Wilmette have come to expect. The process of developing a balanced 2010 budget that retains all Village services proved to be challenging, and the Village continues to strive to find additional savings on a daily basis.

Despite significant increases in pension expense as discussed in President Canning's message, the Village has been able to reduce general fund operating expenses by \$1.4 million while maintaining services, without drawing on reserves. As the pie chart to the right indicates, 86% of the Village's expenses are for Police, Fire and Public Works Services.


In order to maintain the level of services residents of Wilmette deserve, the Village Board undertook a number of initiatives to reduce expenses, including:


- Eliminating positions through attrition
- Reducing the number of work hours from 40 to 32 hours per week for 15 employees
- Freezing pay for department heads
- Staff reorganization of the Police Department
- Deferring replacement of equipment

Given these expense reductions, the Village's 3.95% tax levy increase is at its lowest level since 1999. The tax levy increase is solely comprised of increased pension expense, debt service related to previous infrastructure improvements. primarily street resurfacing and a small replenishment of the Village's reserve fund.



As the chart above indicates, the Village's portion of the property tax accounts for only 11% of your total property tax bill.













#### 2010 CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

Visit the 2010 capital improvement map on the Engineering Department's section of the Village website to view the areas where construction work is tentatively scheduled.

In addition to the annual Road Program (\$1,150,000) and Alley Program (\$150,000), the Village is the recipient of two grants for roadwork. 10th Street/Wilmette Avenue from Sheridan Road to Lake Avenue will be resurfaced using American Reinvestment and Recovery Act funds. Isabella Street from Green Bay Road to 14th Street will be resurfaced with funds from the State's Emergency Repair Program. The scope of work for these projects includes resurfacing the street and curb, as well as sidewalk and sewer repairs as needed.

#### SPRING TREE PLANTING

The Village's Cooperative Tree Planting Program enables residents to plant a tree on the parkway by sharing the cost with the Village. To reserve a tree, applications for the program must be turned in no later than March 29th. To register, pick up an application at the Village Hall or download one by visiting Public Works on the Village website. ### IS YOUR LAWN SPRINKLER SYSTEM IN **COMPLIANCE?**

The Illinois Environmental Protection Agency, the Illinois Plumbing Code, and the Village Code require that cross connection control devices be installed on all lawn sprinkler systems. This device protects the public water supply by preventing potentially contaminated water from flowing back into the Village's water supply. The Village Code applies to all sprinkler systems, including older systems installed before the ordinance was passed.

The ordinance also requires that cross connection valves be tested annually. The tests must be certified by a plumber and the results submitted to the Village's Water Plant Meter Shop at the Wilmette Water Plant, 200 Lake Ave. Wilmette, IL prior to system activation in spring.

#### CHANGE IN POLICE DEPARTMENT **EMAIL NOTIFICATION SYSTEM**

As of January 1, 2010, the Wilmette Police Department discontinued its use of the Silent Partner Alert System to send community crime alerts and will instead use the Village of Wilmette's E-news. Registering for Crime Alerts through E-news is a simple four step process:

#### FALSE FIRE ALARM FEES

In response to the 489 false alarms responded to by the Wilmette Fire Department in 2009, the Village has implemented false fire alarm fees. False alarms are defined as: The activation of any fire alarm system through mechanical failure, malfunction, improper installation, or the improper operation or negligence of the owner or lessee of any fire alarm system or of his employees or agents.

False alarms are a very serious problem – they not only result in considerable expense to the public, they jeopardize the safety of the Fire Department personnel who must respond to the false alarms.

The new fees are intended to encourage alarm users to repair malfunctioning alarms and as such, a fee is not assessed for the first false alarm at a particular property. Failure to repair the alarm system after the first false alarm within a calendar year will result in fines. For more information, contact the Fire Department at 847-251-1101.
