

Wilmette Police Department Historical Facts

The Wilmette Police Department was established in 1886 when the Wilmette Village Board of Trustees adopted an ordinance providing that the President and Board of Trustees would serve as police officers, along with any additional officers appointed by the Board.

In the early years police officers were responsible to see that roaming domestic animals were kept off the sidewalks and that foraging cows did not enter stores and consume the green vegetables. They also were present at dances, picnics, celebrations and other public events.

The Wilmette Police Department today provides a full range of law enforcement services, responding to nearly 18,000 calls each year. The Wilmette Police Department currently has 44 sworn officers and 14 full-time civilian employees. Sworn personnel include the following: Chief of Police, 2 Deputy Chiefs, 1 Commander, 7 Sergeants, and 33 Police Officers.

In 1986 the Wilmette Police Department became the 3rd agency in Illinois and the 29th nationwide to earn accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, making it a leader in receiving this professional recognition. Since 1991 the Wilmette Police have required a four year college degree at the entry level and today is in the upper 1% nationwide in officer education.

Full time assignments in the department exist in patrol, criminal and juvenile investigations. Additionally, collateral assignments within patrol include evidence technician, regional teams such as: the emergency services team (N.I.P.A.S.), mobile field force team, major crimes task force, burglary task force, and major crash assistance team. There are also assignments including, field training officer, defensive tactics instructor, firearms instructor, DUI specialist, emergency vehicle operations instructor and traffic accident re-constructionists.

The Wilmette Police Department employs 44 sworn officers who serve a community of 27, 363 residents spanning an area of over 5.41 square miles. In addition, the department employs 14 full time and 9 part-time civilian employees who provide essential services such as Records, Tele-Communications, Property & Evidence, Parking Enforcement, Executive Support, Ancillary Traffic and Social Work.


The Department is organized into two Divisions:

Operations

This Division provides for two basic functions; Patrol & Investigations, Patrol provides first-line emergency response to crimes in progress, accidents and tactical situations, Investigations handles major investigations of all types of adult and juvenile offenders as well as missing persons of all ages. This Division also includes the School Resource Officer and Youth Diversion program.

Services

This Division includes Records, Communications and all ancillary duties. It receives all emergency 911 and non-emergency calls for service and ensures that appropriate resources are dispatched in a timely manner. It maintains all departmental records and arrest warrants in accordance with federal, state and local laws/ordinances, issues various permits and assists the public with a variety of requests and services.



Promotions

The Police department saw three of it's members promoted in 2014.

On January 21st, 2014 Kyle Murphy was named Deputy Chief of Operations and Solveig Gehrken was promoted to the rank of Sergeant. Sergeant Gehrken is the first female to be promoted in the 127 years of Village history. She is current assigned to the Patrol Division.

Landon Girard was promoted on April 17, 2014 to the rank of Sergeant and is also currently assigned to the Patrol Division.

Robert Folkerts was hired in December of 2014. He attended the College of DuPage and Western Illinois University, majoring in law enforcement with a minor in sociology.




Two new civilian employees were hired in 2014. Jon Merrill was hired as a Telecommunicator in April and Janet Guavita joined the Records Division in September.


CIVILIAN OF THE YEAR 2013




20 YEAR TRAFFIC CRASH COMPARISON





The decrease in traffic accidents may be due to a number of factors. First, roadway upgrades at several problem intersections have reduced crashes. Second, enforcement efforts have consistently been matched to high accidents locations.

DUI crashes decrease is contributed to several factors: aggressive enforcement, public education and driver's license suspensions by the Secretary of State.

Illinois Law Enforcement Alarm System (ILEAS)



ILEAS is a statewide police mutual aid system with over 700 member agencies. Wilmette is a member of Region II of the ILEAS plan, which incorporates mutual aid responses from towns in Lake Cook and DuPage Counties. In 2014, Wilmette Police Officers responded to twelve requests for mutual aid. Wilmette did not request ILEAS assistance for any incident during in 2014.

Northern Illinois Police Alarm System (NIPAS)



NIPAS is a police mutual aid system operating in Northeastern Illinois. NIPAS was established by an intergovernmental agreement in 1983 and now has 99 member agencies. NIPAS has three main components: Mutual Aid System, Emergency Services Teams (EST) and Mobile Field Force (MFF). The Mutual Aid System provides for participating agencies to send police officers to the requesting municipality in the event of a natural disaster or special event. EST is a full service police tactical team designed to handle high-risk incidents. MFF is a unit designed to respond to incidents of civil disturbance and consists of an arrest team, weapons team, extraction team and command team.

North Regional Major Crimes Task Force—NORTAF

The North Regional Major Crimes Task Force (NORTAF) consists of investigators and forensic specialists from thirteen local police departments (northern Cook County). NORTAF assists member municipalities in the investigation of homicides, non-parental kidnappings and school shootings.

North Regional Burglary Task Force—NORTAF

In April of 2005, the thirteen NORTAF member agencies authorized the permanent addition of the NORTAF Burglary Task Force for the purpose of investigating burglary patterns that affect the member agency municipalities.

North Regional Major Crash Assistance Team—NORTAF



In the mold of the other NORTAF Task Forces, the Major Crash Assistance Team (MCAT) was developed in order to assist member agencies with the investigation of a major crash occurring in their respective community. Experienced Crash Investigators and Forensic Specialists were organized into teams and provided with equipment and additional training.

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS

In 2014 the Investigations Unit was staffed by **Sergeant Michael McGarry, Detectives Alex Mercado, Landon Girard, Christopher Neubauer and Michael Clark**. This unit is responsible for conducting thorough follow-up investigations of all cases brought to the attention of the Department, including: identifying, apprehending and assisting in the prosecution of criminal offenders; locating witnesses; collecting physical evidence; recovering property; and preparing cases for court.

Investigators are responsible for tracking crime patterns, collecting and disseminating intelligence information to patrol personnel and to representatives of other law enforcement agencies, and maintaining open lines of communication between the Wilmette Police Department, the schools, community groups and court officials. Wilmette Investigators also serve as the Department's Juvenile Officers and are certified as such by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board.

Several of the significant investigations the Wilmette Police Department conducted in 2014 are detailed in this section. Some of the cases are still awaiting adjudication and did not have court dispositions at the time of this publication.

Sexual Abuse

In July, Detectives investigated the allegations made by the parents of a minor child that he had been sexually abused by his juvenile male babysitter. Evidence collected from the victim's bedroom was sent to the crime lab and substantiated these allegations. The suspected offender was interviewed by Detectives and admitted to abusing the child on one occasion. He was petitioned to juvenile court on one count of *Aggravated Criminal Sexual Abuse*.

Continuing Financial Crimes Enterprise

In June, Detectives investigated the attempted identity theft of a Wilmette Resident. Detectives linked the attempted Identity theft through an IP address to a residence in Chicago. They executed a search warrant at the Chicago residence and arrested a male subject who was living there. He later made admissions that he made attempts to open accounts using Wilmette and Winnetka victims' personal information. He was charged with *Continuing a Financial Crimes Enterprise*.

Continuing Financial Crimes Enterprise (Retail Theft)

In July, Detectives arrested a Chicago man after their investigation into several retail thefts from the Walgreens at 3232 Lake Ave. The thefts had been occurring since November of 2013. The Chicago man was charged with *Continuing a Financial Crimes Enterprises*.

Retail Theft

In February, Detectives were returning to Wilmette from Glenview and overheard a Wilmette radio broadcast of a retail theft that had just occurred at the Walgreens at 3232 Lake Ave. The radio broadcast included a description of the two offenders, their vehicle and the license plate. Detectives stopped the suspects in their vehicle on I-94 at Wilson Ave. They were in possession of proceeds from the store. The offenders were charged with *Retail Theft*.

Retail Theft

In November, Detectives were assigned several retail thefts of alcohol from the Walgreens at 811 Green Bay Rd. The offender in these thefts matched the description of a suspect in similar thefts from stores in neighboring communities and was familiar to Wilmette Police Personnel from previous contacts with him. The suspect was positively identified through the stores video surveillance. He was charged with *Retail Theft* in Wilmette and Glenview.

Retail Theft

In March, Detectives investigated a retail theft in which several high end vacuum cleaners were stolen from the Walgreens at 3232 Lake Ave. Store Personnel were able to provide a description of the two suspects, the vehicle they were driving and its license plate. Through their investigation, Detectives learned that the same offenders were suspect in similar retail thefts in neighboring communities. Detectives located a pawn shop where one of the offenders pawned one of the vacuum cleaners stolen from the Walgreen's in Wilmette. One of the offenders was later arrested at his home in Palatine and the other was arrested in Chicago. They gave admissions to their involvement in numerous retail thefts in several jurisdictions. They were each charged with *Retail Theft*.

Retail Theft

In July, Detectives investigated several retail thefts that occurred at the Walgreens at 3232 Lake Ave. in each of the cases the same offenders stole several bottles of expensive liquor. Detectives learned that as well as in Cook County, the offenders had also committed similar retail thefts in DuPage County and Lake County. Detectives worked with investigators from these other jurisdictions and identified the offender. Detectives picked the offender up while he was appearing in criminal court on an unrelated case. He gave admissions to his involvement in numerous retail thefts in multiple jurisdictions. He was charged with *Retail Theft* in DuPage County, Lake County and Cook County.

Graffiti

In October, Wilmette Patrol Officers stopped two subjects near 3rd Street and Maple because of suspicious behavior. While speaking with these subjects, a CTA employee reported fresh graffiti on several train cars in the train yard. The patrol officers continued questioning the subjects they had stopped and learned that they were responsible for the CTA graffiti. The subsequent investigation by detectives resulted in two more offenders being arrested and charged with felony criminal damage and information that these four subjects were responsible for graffiti in several other jurisdictions.

Burglary (Garage)

In November, Detectives investigated several auto burglaries that occurred on the east side of Wilmette during the overnight hours in which the offender took cash, clothing and six bicycles. One of the victims discovered that one of his stolen bicycles was listed for sale on craigslist.com.

Detectives contacted the seller and arranged to purchase the bike. Detectives met the seller of the stolen bike in Evanston. They verified it was one of the stolen bicycles and took the offender into custody. Detectives recovered 5 of 6 stolen bicycles and returned them to their owners. The offender was charged with two counts of *Burglary*.

Burglary (Auto)

In June, Detectives investigated several auto burglaries that occurred on the east side of Wilmette during the overnight hours in which the offender took cash and clothing. At about the time some of the burglaries were being reported, a suspect was located in the area. He was interviewed by detectives and admitted to his involvement in the theft of items from several vehicles. The offender was charged with two counts of *Burglary*.

Burglary (Garage/ Auto)

In August, Detectives investigated a garage and auto burglary that occurred in the early morning hours on the east side of Wilmette. A patrol officer stopped a suspicious subject the same morning as the burglaries, but before they had been reported. This subject was identified at that time and released. This subject was later contacted by detectives and he agreed to meet with them at the Wilmette Police Department. During the subsequent interview, the subject admitted to committing the garage and auto burglary. He was charged with one count of *Burglary*.

Burglary (School)

In December, Detectives investigated 2 separate burglaries that occurred overnight at Baker Demonstration School. The offenders stole approximately \$51,000.00 dollars' worth of computers and calculators. During their investigation, Detectives discovered that one of the stolen calculators had been pawned at a Chicago pawn shop. Through pawn shop records, detectives were able to identify the person who pawned the stolen calculator. The investigation led to the arrest of a male juvenile from Chicago. At the time of his arrest, the juvenile offender was in possession of hydrocodone, cannabis, cocaine, GHB, a computer tablet from Baker Demonstration School as well as a laptop that was stolen in a burglary committed at a school in Winnetka. He was petitioned to juvenile court for *Burglary* and *Drug Possession*.

Theft

In August, Detectives investigated the theft of jewelry from a residence in which a painting crew had been working at the time of the theft. Detectives located one of the stolen pieces of jewelry at a Buffalo Grove pawn shop and were able to identify the person who pawned the item. Detectives confirmed that person was part of the painting crew working in the home at the time of the theft. He was charged with *Theft*.

Theft

In January, Detectives investigated a theft of jewelry from a residence in which the victim suspected his cleaning lady was responsible. Detectives interviewed the suspected cleaning lady and she admitted to taking several items from the victim's residence. She was charged with *Theft*.

Theft

In May and June, Detectives investigated several bike thefts from the Metra train station in Wilmette, but were unable to develop a strong suspect. In June, a neighboring community arrested a subject for attempting to steal a bike from their Metra train station. Detectives searched this subject through pawn shop records and learned that he had pawned several bikes matching the description of those stolen from the Metra train station in Wilmette. This subject was arrested at his home in Chicago and taken to the Wilmette Police Department where he admitted to stealing several bikes from the train station in Wilmette. Several bicycles were recovered from Chicago Pawn Shops. The offender was charged with one count of *Theft*.



Total Calls for Service in 2014





Feb. 11, 1956: Officers arrest a suspect believed to be involved in a robbery of First Federal Savings and Loan Association. Two others were also arrested.

All officers are mandated to complete a wide variety of annual trainings and certification courses to insure that they maintain their skills and are aware of any changes in case law, law enforcement techniques and emerging trends. In the past year training topics included rapid deployment exercises, dealing with subjects exhibiting mental health issues, defensive tactics, tactical firearms, first aid, AED activations, and numerous other skill enhancement topics.

The Wilmette Police Department maintains a professional bearing, and is open to scrutiny by the public and from within. The Department maintains an open and accepting form of taking complaints about the actions or inactions of its employees, First line supervisors are required to exercise good judgement and common sense when they are made aware of a complaint that are categorized as “informal” (examples include the allegations of tardiness, rudeness, grooming and/ or dress violations,). When a complaint meets the criteria to be categorized as formal, the department opens and assigns a formal internal investigation into the allegation. All three of the 2014 investigations were “informal complaints” and are listed on the below table.
